## AFFAIRS OF NAPLES.

NAPLES, MARCH 2.

On the evening of the 27th of last month a deputation from the Parliament waited on the Prince Regent to announce to him the close of the extraordinary Parliament, and the opening of the ordinary Session. The deputation having been introduced to the audience chamber, Signor Calatano addressed his Royal Highness in the following terms:—

" May it please your Royal Highness. —The National Parliament, convoked by your Royal Highness out of the usual course, upon the reception of the communications from Laybach, has terminated its sittings. In the difficult circumstances in which it was placed, it flatters itself that it has acted conformably with the wishes of your Royal Highness, and in a manner becoming the dignity of the nation and the majesty of the Constitutional Throne.

" May the firmness it has exhibited serve as an example to other nations, and fill with terror the souls of the enemies of this innocent nation. The Parliament begs your Royal Highness, to assist at the closing of its extraordinary sittings, unless your Royal Highness be prevented by other important affairs of Government.

moderation and wisdom it has displayed in its deliberations.

" Adhering to the wishes of the nation, in continuing true to the oaths by which each individual is bound, and maintaining the most perfect harmony with the government, the parliament has most zealously furnished the necessary means for the defence of the national independence.

" I am equally pleased to express to you the satisfaction I feel in seeing that, notwithstanding the fervour of the national enthusiasm for the common defence, nothing has occurred to disturb the order and tranquillity of the capital or the provinces; and that, on the contrary, each citizen has been markedly emulous to concur in supporting good order, to the maintenance of which I feel how much the conduct of the representatives of the nation has contributed.

" The justice of our cause authorizes us to hope that the God of armies will approve our efforts, and lend his all powerful arm to conduct us to victory, by which we may obtain a glorious peace.

(Signed) " FRANCIS, Regent."

Yesterday morning, the 1st. inst. the National Parliament opened its session for 1821. His Royal Highness the Prince Regent assisted at the solemn ceremony with her Royal Highness the Duchess of Calabria, his wife, his august family, and the Prince of Salerno, his brother. The Court was in full state: the Royal party entered the chamber amidst the applauses of an immense number of spectators.

After ascending the throne his Royal Highness said—

" Gentlemen—The great prudence and energetic measures adopted by the extraordinary Parliament, which yesterday closed its sittings, have furnished all the necessary means for placing our loved country in a situation to defend itself vigorously, and to support the constitutional throne of my august father. The conduct of the last Parliament inspires me with the greatest confidence that, in this new Session, you will continue with the same enthusiasm, and with the same wisdom, to provide every means of rendering us more formidable to the unjust aggressors of our country.

" You must feel assured that, on my side, I have spared no trouble or care to second, with the greatest possible promptitude, your multiplied and admirable efforts, tending to maintain our national independence with vigour and magnanimity. You may, therefore, rest assured that I will employ all the means which the Constitution gives to the executive power, in order to effect the desired object of repelling the aggression of the enemy.

" For this purpose I intend, conjointly with my beloved brother, to appear before the army, in order to give it an unequivocal assurance that I watch over its interests, and will provide for its wants; and that while I traverse the districts which it occupies, I will also interest myself in every thing that concerns those provinces.

" I confidently hope that our troops of every description will, by their bravery, and the ardent love they bear their country, intimidate our unprovoked aggressors, repulse them, and adorn themselves with the laurels of a glorious victory, and that they may finally re-enter into the bosom of their families, and enjoy in tranquillity the blessings of peace.

" In the meantime, may perfect harmony reign amongst you; and may you in all your thoughts and all your actions display those admirable virtues which may render you estimable even in the eyes of your enemies, by showing them that you are worthy of the liberty you enjoy."

At the conclusion of his speech, his Royal Highness was cheered with the loudest acclamations, which were repeated when he retired with his suite.
