AFFAIRS OF NAPLES.

NAPLES, MARCH 2. ---On the evening of the 27th of last month pear to the Plaintiff's Bill, on or before the la deputation from the Parhament waited on the Prince Regent to announce to him the close of the extraordinary Parliament, and the opening of the ordinary Session. The deputation having been introduced to the audience chamber, Signor Calatano addressed his Royal Highness in the following terms :---

> " May it please your Royal Highness. -The National Parliament, convoked by your Röyal Highness out of the usual course, upon the reception of the communications from Laybach, has terminated us sittings. In the difficult circumstances in which it was placed, it flatters itself that it has acted conformably with the wishes of your Royal Highness, and in a manner becoming the dignity of the nation and the majesty of the Constitutional Throne.

" May the firmness it has exhibited serve as an example to other nations, and fill with terror the souls of the enemies of this innocent nation. The Parliament b gs your Roval Highness, to assist at the closing of its extraordinary sittings, unless your Royal rested by the ordinary process of law, as is al. Highness be prevented by other important

"We, at the same time, venture to request your Royal Highness to honour with your presence the opening of the ordinary Parliament. which will hold its first sitting on the 1st of March, to take into consideration the nomination of Signer Arcovito, to the office of President, and that of Signor Poeiro to the office of Vice-President." His Royal Highness replied -

" I am satisfied with the labours of the extraordinary Parliament. I am particularly pleased with the respect and veneration it has displayed towards my august father, and with the measures it has adopted for providing for the subsistence of the army destined to defend the country. I am scrry that it will be impossible for me to assist at the close of the extractdinary Parliament, being prevented by important business. I will, however, assist at the opening of the new Session in March, and of this you may

your thoughts and all your actions display The day before yesterday, the 28th of February, his Royal Highness addressed the following letter to the Deputies of the Parhament :--of the liberty you erjoy." " Gentlemen, - The extraordinary Parliament, which this day closed its sutings, is entitled to my perfect approbation for the respect which it has exhibited towards the retired with his suite. rendering us more formidable to the unjust aggressors of our country.

"You must feel assured that, on my side. I have spared no trouble or care to second, with the greatest possible promptitude, your multiplied and admitable efforts, tending to maintain our national independence with vigour and magnanimuy. You may, therefore, rest assured that I will employ all the means which the Constitution gives to the executive power, in order to effect the desired object of repelling the aggression of the enemy.

" For this purpose I intend, conjointly with my beloved brother, to appear before the atmy. in order to give it an unequivocal assurance that I watch over its interests, and will provide for its wants; and that while I traverse the districts which it occupies, I will also interest myself in every thing that concerns those proxinces.

" I confidently hope that our troops of every description will, by their bravery, and the ardent love they bear their country, intimidate our unprovoked agg essots, iepulse them, and adorn themselves with the laurels of a glorious vicury, and that they may finally re-enter into the bosom of their families, and enjoy in tranquillity the blessings of prace.

" In the meantime, may perfect harmony reign amongst you ; and may you in all assure the Parliament." those admirable virtues which may render you estimable even in the eyes of your enemies, by showing them that you are worthy At the conclusion of his speech, his Royal Highness was cheered with the loudest acclamations, which were repeated when he
