COLONIAL TRADE.

It is calculated that the Timber alone, shipped during the present year from Miramichi, St. John, St. Andrew, &c. in New-Brunswick, for different parts of the United Kingdom, will amount to upwards of £200,000 sterling, at the low price of 15s. per load.

Upwards of 180,000 tons of Plaster of Paris, are said to have been exported to the United States, within the same period, from the shores of the Bay of Fundy—Halifax Chronicle.

London, Oct. 1.

The Government have ordered all the telegraphs between the Admiralty and the out-ports of England to be put in perfect repair. The old manner of communicating is laid aside, the new mode being considered infinitely more expeditious and comprehensive. By the change of system the question given at the home station will only be known to the officer who presents it, and to him who last receives it at the distant port. All persons immediately employed will only have to make the fac simile of the first signal, and the returns, which may be received in 15 minutes, at the distance of 72 miles if the atmosphere be favourable. The workmen are busily employed at the Admiralty, at West-square, and other places.—It is conjectured this repair is for the more speedy communication of intelligence during his Majesty's absence on the Continent.

Oct. 6.

According to the accounts in the French papers of Tuesday, said to have been received through Vienna, the Emperor of Russia has forbidden the exportation of grain from the shore of the Black Sea: this measure is undoubtedly calculated to produce considerable distress in Constantinople as the supply from Egypt and Asia Minor is rendered precarious by the vigilance of the Greek cruisers. But though it may be destined to accelerate an accommodation between the Turkish Government and its revolted subjects, it can scarcely be treated as an act of hostility.

Oct. 8.

Government have entered into a contract for ten thousand loads of mahogany for ship-building on account of the high price of oak timber, and its liability to the dry rot.

The reports on the Stock Exchange anticipate an increase of between £300,000 and £400,000 in the produce of the public revenue for the quarter ending on the 10th instant, as compared with the corresponding quarter in last year.

On the King's landing at Milford, particular notice was taken of the stone on which he first placed his foot, and this was immediately seized upon by some Freemasons in the town, who deposited it as a precious relic with due solemnity in their Lodge. The prize, however, was too valuable to remain undisputed. The Lord of the Manor put in his claim for the possession of the stone, and his demand being backed by the strength of a legal opinion, prevailed over the mere possession of the Freemasons, and the stone was reluctantly surrendered.
