

2d. That the furrows should be drawn as straight as possible, and from 9 to 10 inches wide.

3d. That the work should be concluded with a mould furrow.

The Prizes were not, however, awarded in conformity to them, which is on many accounts to be regretted, as tending to throw into confusion the proceedings of the Society, and also to cause jealousy and dissatisfaction among the competitors, and to excite a well-founded discontent in the mind of any candidate who finds himself, after a strict and faithful discharge of his allotted task, deprived of the honours he has fairly earned. It is possible that the Rules might have been defective, but unless they were altered by the proper authority, before the commencement of the Ploughing, the prizes should have been given accordingly; as at other meetings of the Society, errors could be peaceably and properly rectified, and no injustice could be complained of, where the regulations known to all, were fully complied with.

The Ploughing was in general excellent, and after a contest, in which much skill was exhibited, the following Candidates received the Society's Prizes, viz:--

Mr. Maxwell Rankin, 1st prize, £2 10, with the Society's Silver Medal.

Mr. Jonathan Godfrey, in the employ of Mr. Adam Dickey, 2d prize, £1 10, with the like medal.

13TH NOVEMBER, 1821.

The English Mail for September, arrived here yesterday. The accounts received by the Packet are not so late as those which we have extracted from the Halifax Free Press—brought there by the ship Victory from Liverpool.

LONDON, SEPTEMBER 18.

The contents of the French Papers of Saturday, which arrived this morning, still leave undetermined the question between Russia and the Porte.

PARIS, SEPT. 15.—A letter from Lisle of the 9th says, that orders have been sent by Government to Calais, to make every necessary arrangement for the reception of the King of England, who is expected in the course of next week."

THE HARVEST.

PORTSMOUTH, SEPT. 16.—Owing to the late unfavourable state of the weather, the price of wheat has experienced a most scandalous rise. Till lately the average price was £12 and £12 10s. a load, sales effected at £14 were considered high; and £15 it was supposed would have been the maximum. But at Wilton and at Chichester, old wheats on the last market days, were advanced to the enormous price of £24 and £25 per load. By the provisions of the Corn Bill, when the price should amount to £20 a load, in five maritime counties, the importation of foreign grain was to be permitted. The expedience and policy of such a measure may now, probably, be felt and understood. The people are seldom the best judges of that which most conduces to their own welfare.

Our Launceston Correspondent writes, that the wheat crop in the higher part of the country is in general more than an average one, and that the greater part has been saved without injury.—(West Briton.)

DONCASTER.—The harvest in this neighbourhood has become general, and a great quantity of corn has been housed during last week, in good condition.

A large portion of the wheat harvest in this neighbourhood has been secured, but a great quantity of barley, oats, and beans, still remain on the ground.—(Taunton Courier.)

The King, we believe, will leave town on Saturday next for the Continent, on his way to Hanover. His Majesty, it is said, will embark at Dover for Calais, and make a short stay at the Silver Lion in that place, whilst the Royal carriages, &c. are landing. We understand that a Council of Regency was appointed yesterday.

Some of the Farmers in England are said to have now on hand, the principal part of the grain harvest of the three past years, reserved for better markets.
