## LONDON, SEPT. 18.

" FRANKFOLT, Sept. 9 .-- One of the principal mercantile houses at Venice, has received from the Captain of one of their Vessels, the news that the Ottoman Squadron and the Greek fleet were in sight of each other. He states that as a battle could not fail to take place in a day or two, he had resolved on remaining for the time at Ipsara, where he had recently arrived.

.. The French cabinet courier, Lafortier, coming from Petersburgh with dispatches, passed through Berlin on the 6th, on his way to Paris. He shewed the greatest anxiety to reach his destination with every

dispatch. We hear from Corfu that intelligence has been received there of the arrival in the Morea of a considerable number of French, English, and German Officers, to take part with the insurgent Greeks. An American ship, the Mississippi, arrived lately in the Archipelago, having on board several French officers; among whom was an officer of Engineers, Amedee de Renneville, who was born in the environs of Pargo, and who is known by a pamphlet which he published formerly against Napoleon, entitled La Feuille verte.

" MAYENCE, Sept. 5 .-- The immediate meeting of a Congress, composed, if not of the great Monarchs, at least of the principal Ministers, is much talked of in our Province. What is very certain, however, is, that preparations are making at the Castle of Johannaberg for the reception of its august possessor, whose arrival is expected at latest about the same time the King of England will visit this country. This Monarch is expected-at Homburg towards the end of

this month.

HERMANSTADT, (Transylvania) Aug. 22.--- According to letters from Bucharest of the 19th, the famous Caniman Sava, one of the Traitors denounced by Ypsilanti to posterity, arrived at Bucharest on the 18th with 500 Arnauts. He had met and brought with him 150 Hetaerists, to whom he had promised an amnesty on the part of the Seraskier of Vraila; but on entering Bucharest he delivered them over to the Turks, who shot part of them and impaled the others. Sava was well received by the Scraskier. The Arnauts were billetted in different houses; but the next day Sava was desired to repair to the Seraskier's house, where he was shot immediately on his arrival. The Arnauts made some resistance, but the Turks set fire to the houses in which they had shut themselves up, and the greater number perished in the flames. Travellers, who quitted Bucharest on the 19th, and who communicate these details, add, that Capt. Dimanli, whom Sava delivered up to the Turks, has been impaled alive.

NEW-YORK, NOV. 1.

The ship Orion which arrived yesterday, sailed from Liverpool September 2191. Capt. Davis brought no papers except Myor's Liverpool Price Current and Shipping List of the 17th, and we do not learn that there was any political news. A few letters from Liverpool as the 20th are received. The subjoined extract will give a view of the market at that date. It appears the weather had been such as to encourage a hope that the harvest would not be so much injured as was feared when the Hercules sailed. -

Extract of a letter --- Liverpool, Sept. 20. "The weather, yesterday and the day before being dry, staggered the faith of the Corn folks a good deal---besides, the price s fallen in London---but this day we have good deal of rain, and the weather looks no means settled, so that if this letter iches you before the arrival of the Hercues, &c. you need not hesitate to buy flour icely at six dollars.

SAINT JOHN, Nov. 14.

ARRIVED.

Three Partners, Huchcock, Kingston, Jam. 43.—The following particulars are furnished by Capt. H. having been boarded off Cape Antonio by a pirate :--- On the 8th of October off Cape Antonio, I was boarded by a boat manned with seven men, from a schr. of about 50 tons, armed with cutlasses and long Spanish knives, who drove the crew below, leaving the mate and gook to work the vessel, with two of the ruffians threatening their lives; same time ordered me below, beating me with a cutlass, and two of the marauders followed down, demanding the money I obtained for my cargo. I replied, the cargo was not sold when I left Jamaica; they said that story would not do, and instantly seizing me by the throat, threatened to put an end to my existence if I did not give them the money. I still persisted that there was none. They called for the cook's axe, and broke up the after lockers, where unfortunately they found 46 L. I begged them for it, telling them it was my own: they said they would take nothing that belonged to me, if I would give them the vessel's money. I still persisted there was no more. The chief of the gang then went on deck and sent one down more inhuman than the rest, who with his comrade seized me again, stying repeatedly, "give me your money, or I will kill you;" by this time I was nearly speechless, and pointed to the money that was on the table. They told me I lied, attempting to stab me, then lest me a sew minutes to accover my breath. I was then ordered on deck and forward, when a rope was placed about my neck, saying, "If I did not give up the money quick, they would hang me." I persisted again they had all that was on board; they immediately hoisted me two or three feet from the deck, beating me most cruelly with a cutlass---after remaining up for some time, they lowered me down, when not being able to stand, they hauled me about the deck, with the rope round my neck, jumped on and kicked me in a barbarous manner. They then sent the mate forward, who fell on his knees begging for his life. By this time I recovered myself, and heard them order the cook below, saying they would kill him if he did not tell where the mone; was; he replied that he knew nothing about it. The perfidious villains left us about noon, and took from us the stern boat, gaff topsail, colours, speaking trumpet, spare rope, blocks, &c. also, my watch and all my clothes and those of the mate and seamen. The Pirate then stood in for the land. I spoke the brig Marathon, (from Jam. bound to Iteland) which was a mile to leeward, and informed the Capt. of my misfortunes. Shortly after, the pirate made towards the brig, fired several muskers, and ordered them to send their boat and to be quick about it. They then boarded the brig with 10 or 12 men, and detained them about 9 hours.
