

tively, at any meeting to be holden, at which the major part shall be present, to make and establish such rules, orders, and regulations, in respect of the government, conduct, duty, and behaviour, of the said Firemen, in the working managing, exercising, trying, and using the same Engines, Tools, and Instruments, and to impose and establish such reasonable Fines and Penalties upon them, or any of them, for default or neglect of the duties and services thereby to be enjoined or required, from them, as the said Fire Wards, or the major part of them present, met as aforesaid, shall from time to time think meet, so that the Fine or Penalty shall not exceed, in any one instance, the sum of forty shillings, which rules, orders, and regulations, shall be notified to the said Firemen, by putting the same up at the Fire Engine Houses, and inserting the same in the News-papers, if any there be printed in the said Towns, respectively.

III. *Be it further enacted*, that the said Fines and Penalties shall from time to time be recovered, before any one of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the said Counties of York and Charlotte respectively, on the oath of a credible witness, and levied with costs, by distress and sale of the goods and chattels of the delinquent, and when recovered, be paid into the hands of the Overseers of the Poor, towards the support thereof.

IV. *Be it further enacted*, that the Firemen within the respective Towns of Fredericton and Saint Andrews aforesaid, and each and every of them, from time to time, during their continuance in the office of Firemen, and no longer, shall be, and they are hereby declared to be freed, exempted, and privileged, from the several offices of constable and surveyors of high ways, and from, serving on any Juries in the General Sessions of the Peace and Inferior Courts of Common Pleas, in the said Counties respectively.

V. *And be it further enacted*, that this Act shall continue and be in force for five years, and thence to the end of the then next Session of the General Assembly.

*An ACT for the preservation of the Red and Fallow Deer.*

Passed the 20th of March, 1821.

WHEREAS the preservation of the breed of the Red and Fallow Deer, may be highly useful to the Inhabitants of this Province—

I. *Be it therefore enacted by the Lieutenant-Governor, Council, and Assembly*, That from and after the passing of this Act, no person or persons whatsoever, shall under any pretence whatsoever, take, kill, wound, or otherwise destroy, any Red or Fallow Deer, in this Province.

II. *And be it further enacted*, that every person who shall take, kill, wound, or destroy, any Red or Fallow Deer, or shall sell, or expose to sale, or buy, or cause to be bought, or shall have in his or her possession, any Red or Fallow Deer, or any skin, or flesh, or any part of the skin or flesh, of any Red or Fallow Deer, so taken, killed, wounded, or destroyed, shall for each and every offence, forfeit and pay a sum not less than five pounds, and not exceeding ten pounds, with costs; to be paid to the Informer, upon due conviction thereof, by the oath of one or more credible witness or witnesses, before any two of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace in the County where such offence shall be committed, or before any two Justices, of the Peace of any adjoining County; to be levied by warrant of distress and sale of the offender's goods and chattels; rendering the overplus, if any, to such offenders; and for want of sufficient goods and chattels, the said Justices are hereby required to commit such offender to the Common Gaol of the County where such offence shall be committed, or to the Gaol of any adjoining County, there to remain for a time, not less than fifteen days, nor exceeding thirty days.

III. *And be it further enacted*, that this Act shall continue and be in force for five years, and thence, to the end of the next Session of the General Assembly, and no longer.

B. duly qualified and licensed as by His Majesty's Royal Instructions is required, has been procured and retained as a Master capable to manage the said School, agreeably to the Provisions of the Act of Assembly "to establish Grammar Schools in several Counties in this Province," and that the sum of one hundred pounds has been subscribed by the Inhabitants of the said County, payable and to be paid for the present year, to us the said Trustees and Directors of the said School, in aid of the support and maintenance of the said Master, and that the said School has been kept by the said Master for one half year, ended before the date hereof, and that no money has been heretofore drawn from the Province Treasury by reason or on account of the moiety of the said sum so subscribed and applicable for the use and purpose aforesaid, for the said half year for which this Certificate is given.

LEGISLATURE OF NEW-BRUNSWICK.

[Extracts from the Journal]

Saturday, 17th March.

Mr. Fraser, from the Committee to whom were referred the accounts of the Overseers of the Poor for the Parishes of Fredericton, St. John, Portland, and St. Andrews, reported as follows.

A, is an account of the Overseers of the Poor for the Parish of Fredericton, for expenses actually incurred in the year 1819, in assisting transient Poor, distressed Emigrants, and disbanded Soldiers, amounting to

£305. A credit is given for a warrant on the Treasury for £70; being a balance not provided for of £235. This account is accompanied with an affidavit of the Overseers, and the claim is particularly set forth in the Petition presented to the House.

B, is an account of the Overseers of the Poor for the Parish of Fredericton, for expenses actually incurred in support of transient Poor, distressed Emigrants, and disbanded Soldiers, for the year 1820, amounting to £190 15. This account is accompanied with all the requisite proofs.

C, is an account annexed to the Petition of the Overseers of the Poor for the Parish of Portland, for actual expenses incurred by them in the year 1820, for the support of old Soldiers, Widows of Soldiers, distressed Emigrants, and Black Refugees, amounting to £100 2 4. The particulars of this expenditure are detailed in the Petition; and your Committee are of opinion, that the claim is a reasonable one, and should be allowed.

D, is an account of the Overseers of the Poor for the Parish of St. Andrews, for expenses incurred in the support of transient Poor, old Soldiers, and distressed Emigrants, for the year 1820, amounting to £113 19. This account is annexed to a Petition from the Overseers of the Poor of said Parish, and a certificate from five Magistrates is attached to the Petition, stating the said Petition to be correct. Your Committee are therefore of opinion, that this account should be allowed.

E, is an account of J. O. Betts, Overseer of the Poor for the Parish of St. John, for expenses actually incurred in supporting transient Poor, distressed Emigrants, &c. from the 27th March to 31st Dec. 1820, inclusive, amounting to the sum of £191 18 4. This account is accompanied with all the requisite proofs, and the charges appear to be very reasonable, and not over the current cash prices at the several times of making them.

F, is an account of the Overseers of the Poor for the Parish of St. John, for expenses incurred in the support of transient Poor, distressed Emigrants and Sailors, and disbanded Soldiers, from 1st January to 24th March 1820, amounting to £125 13 4. This account is accompanied by the necessary proofs; and your Committee are of opinion, that this account and the account marked E, should be allowed.

G, is an account with affidavit, of Thomas Paddock, for medicine and attendance on sundry Poor of the Parish of St. John, amounting to the sum of £38 19 11. This account is reasonable, and should in the opinion of your Committee, be allowed.

The House in Committee of Supply.  
Mr. Agnew, Chairman of the Committee reported the following resolutions:

Resolved that there be granted to the Speaker of the House of Assembly, and also to the Members of the House of Assembly, the sum of £40 each, for defraying the expenses of their attendance during the present Session, and 20s. per diem travelling charges, reckoning twenty miles for each day's travel, to be certified by the Speaker, agreeably to a Law of the present Session.

To Eleanor O'Neil, the sum of £20, to remunerate her for the expenses incurred by her late husband, Daniel O'Neil, in maintaining Thomas Loudy and his wife, two aged and infirm Paupers, at Mace's Bay, for one year, previous to the County line being established between St. John and Charlotte.

To Charles Stewart, a resident at the Grand Falls, the sum of £20, to reimburse him for expenses incurred in affording relief to Thomas Croghan and others, indigent Emigrants, travelling that way.

To His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, a sum not exceeding £100 sterling, to be remitted by the Committee of Correspondence, for the purpose of defraying the expenses of Counsel to be employed before Parliament on the subject of the Timber duties, agreeable to the joint Address of His Majesty's Council and this House the present Session, on that subject.

To the Central Agricultural Society of New-Brunswick, a sum not exceeding £500, for the purpose of importing for the use of this Province, two entire horses, the one to be of the English hunter, the other of the Irish hunter breed.

To the Overseers of the Poor in the Parish of Fredericton, for the year 1819, the sum of £235, being the balance of the
