Disastrous Wreck.—On the 5th ultimo, towards six o'clock in the evening, the sch'r Julia, belonging to Mr. Jos. Therien, merchant of Montreal, commanded by Capt. David Mathias, from Chaleurs Bay, loaded with oil and cod fish, was wrecked near Mount-Louis. As it was blowing strong from the N.E. and being dark, she struck with great violence. All on board left her half naked, after having remained on the deck, struggling against the waves, until midnight. The captain, imagining that they were not far from habitations induced the others to accompany him in search of some, notwithstanding the obscurity of the night, and the drifting snow. They thus continued their route until three o'clock the next day, without cloathing, without victuals, without finding any habitation and without knowing where they were. Mr. Therien then suspecting that the captain was in an error, resolved to return to the place of the wreck, in the hope of finding there both victuals and cloathing for himself and his companions, of whom some already began to fail of strength.

The whole then began to retrace their steps; and as each felt his own suffering and weakness, so each strove to arrive as soon as possible at the desired spot, in such manner that the weakest remained the last, without being able to obtain the least assistance from his companions, each of whom feared every instant to remain by the way.

In extreme perils, in common with others, nature seems to concentrate itself in self, leaving, even to the man of the greatest sensibility, no other sentiment than what is necessary to his own preservation. Edouard Acout, a native of Jersey, and Jacques Marchevierre, of Three Rivers, fell and died on the beach before they had travelled half the way; the others, in little better condition, having reached the river à Pierres, were stopped by the high tide, and obliged to take shelter among the bushes; where they passed the night struggling against the elements of death. The next day they arrived at the destined spot, the place of the wreck, where they found one man, named Burke, half buried in sand, on the beach; another, of the name of Daniel Richard, had been drowned the preceding night, whose body had not yet been found. Those who escaped death, were Therien, F. X. De Romme, his clerk, capt. Mathias, Jean Repe and Robert Baynes, who remained 11 days on the shore, wretchedly sheltered, having their feet so swelled and ulcerated by the cold, and so excoriated by the rocks, on which they had walked barefoot, that they were not able to shift from one place to another, otherwise than on their hands and knees.

Therien and Rene, the two most capable, having at length, in some measure, repaired the boat, all embarked; and, in 3 days, arrived at St. Anne du Cap Chatte, where, with incredible labour and pain, they reached Matane, where they received the most prompt assistance and the most touching hospitality, from the Seigneuresse, Mrs. McGibbon. Rene, finding himself too weak to continue the route, and beginning to lose his toes, was obliged to remain under the care of that charitable lady. The sufferers were also greatly indebted, for services, to Mr. Poney, and the people of Mr. Macnider's establishment at Metis.

The loss of the cargo and schooner, the latter having been lashed only 25 days, is valued at more than £2000, on which there was no insurance.

Mr. Therien arrived in Quebec on the 6th inst. with Mr. De Romme and captain Mathias.

THE BANK OF NEW-BRUNSWICK.

This Institution was incorporated and established by an Act of the last Session of the General Assembly, which Act yet remains to receive the Royal Assent.

It has, we find, begun its operations by issuing its Paper and discounting Securities for money: and report says that it has also commenced the important business of exchanging its Paper for that particular species of foreign Gold Coin well known by the name of the Spanish Doubloon, which abounds in this Province more than any other species of circulating medium (if it deserves the name); and referring to the same Report, "that the Bank will not receive it in exchange for its Paper, for a higher value than £3 : 15 : 6," we apprehend it will be a very valuable article in the speculating money concerns of the Bank; more especially if it be true, as further reported; "that the Bank will not issue the Doubloon at that reduced value if they can do better."

It is, we believe, a well known and well established fact, that the Stock-holders have paid in their first Instalment of £15,000 principally in Doubloons at £4. Substituting the word received for paid, it appeared at first view that the Stock-holders run a very great risque of losing; but the fallacy of this is very obvious when we consider that the sum is a deposit of their own money, and if that deposit could have been effected by estimating the Doubloon at £8, the persons making it would have gained one hundred per cent at least, instead of making a losing concern of it.

But has the Bank now in its vaults £15,000? If the sum is in Doubloons, and the Stock-holders have received the Doubloons from themselves at £4 each; and now at the commencement of its operations, refuse to receive them for a larger sum than £3 : 15 : 6 each, how will the statement stand? Valuing the Doubloon at Four pounds, 3750 will make the sum; but at the reduced value it will require 3978½ to make the sum; and of course there must be a deficiency in the vault of 223½ Doubloons. But this is not all—The Act requires that the Bank shall not commence its operations until the sum of £15,000 shall be actually paid in. This language can mean nothing else but that the sum is to be made up in that species of coin which would constitute a legal tender: Indeed the language of the Act is, "that the Capital or Stock shall consist of current Gold and Silver Coins of this Province." The Doubloon is not of that description, and can be considered in no other light than Bullion, in which the Bank is authorized to traffic. If we are right in this position, we may add that the whole mass of Doubloons in the vaults of the Bank will not amount to one pound of the sum required, to be deposited; for the same reason that one thousand Ingots there deposited would not amount to the sum of one pound in money.

The meeting of the General Assembly is near at hand, and it would seem by the 28 Section of the Bank Act, that the two Houses were, by a joint Committee, to be the Supervisors of the Corporation: The Law does not require that a Committee shall be appointed; but it provides that any Committee to be appointed, shall have free access to the Books and Vaults of the Bank. But let us ask, how many of the Members of the two Houses are now, or may hereafter be, Stock-holders? Those who are Stock-holders could not of course be Members of such a Committee; nor could they with propriety vote upon any question for the appointment of that Committee: And suppose for a moment, that the majority of the two Houses were to be Stock-holders, what security will this part of the Law afford to the Public? None. The Law is of vast importance to the Province; and, disclaiming any intention whatever, to impute improper motives or views to the present Members of the Corporation, we must say, that now, in its infancy, the Institution requires the most strict attention of the Legislature and the Public at large. The Stock-holders within the Province, or elsewhere, may vote by Proxy; and the number of Votes which a Member may give, depends upon the quantity of Stock which he possesses: and now any one Stock-holder may increase his number of

Shares without limitation; and it will be seen by a reference to the Act, that the powers of this Corporation are very great: It is empowered to hold real estate to the amount of £3000, in annual income, and indirectly, by way of Mortgage without limitation. But one thing appears to be wanting, which is—to make their Paper a legal tender; unless we may add a dispensation to them, to receive the Doubloons from themselves, at £4, and from Strangers, at £3 : 15 : 6.

It may be that the Bank Paper will drive every other circulating medium out of the country, except Doubloons: and then what will be the comparative situation of the Bank and the Public? Let any Stock-holder in or out of the Province, or other person, answer this question.

We understand that the Public Civil Offices here, have concluded, since the report from St. John, to receive the Doubloon at £3 : 15 : 6, conditionally; to pay the difference between that and any larger sum for which it shall pass—which will depend on the Bank.
