Accounts from Baltimore, to the 6th of Oct. says.—Lord Cochrane has lately made a seizure in the Part of Arico of upwards of 100,000 dollars, belonging to the brig Macedonian of Boston, last from Canton, for a breach of blockade; the brig was afterwards sent to sea under command of a midshipman late of the Macedonian frigate.—Sir Thomas Hardy, commodore of the British squadron, had protested against the extent of the blockade declared by the Chilean government, and had declared that he should not respect it beyond the limits of three leagues to windward and leeward of Callao, and that within these limits a blockading force should actually be kept up.

From the Halifax Free Press.
Extract of a letter received from N. York, dated Oct. 3.

Capt. Coulston late of the Alligator goes in the Hunter, Sears, this day for Halifax;—when 5 days out from Jamaica, he was boarded by a Pirate Vessel with 18 Spaniards from Hayanna, plundered of about 7000 dollars, severely beaten, and twice hung with a rope, and was afterwards cut down apparently dead; his sails were almost all taken away, and in a few days afterwards lost his vessel and was picked up by a French Man of war, having been four days out in an open boat, and was landed at Havana; from whence he arrived here last evening, his crew were all saved.

LONDON, AUG. 22.

An express has reached town to day from Paris, the accounts by which have rather strengthened the belief of a war between Russia and Turkey, notwithstanding the assurances to the contrary in the private advices from Constantinople. Those also from Paris by this conveyance are to the same effect. The steadiness in the prices of all foreign public securities gives a negative to the statements of the immediate commencement of hostilities.

PARIS, Aug. 25.—The Court will go into mourning on Sunday next, for twenty-one days, on account of the death of the Queen of England; the mourning is to be black for the first eleven days, and white for the last ten days.
