

At St. Omer's, she was met by Lord Hutchinson and Mr Brougham, the former of whom proposed to her terms of accommodation, which she rejected and proceeded to London.

June 6.—Her Majesty arrived in London, and took up her temporary residence in the house of Mr. Alderman Wood.

#### Latest from England.

By the arrival at New-York on Monday last, of the long-expected ship Amity capt. Maxwell, in 58 days from Liverpool, London papers to the 30th, Lloyd's Lists, and London Shipping Lists to the 28th Nov. and Liverpool papers to the 1st Dec. have been received. We avail ourselves of the selections contained in the New-York papers which, as well he seen, furnish considerable interesting political intelligence. Among the most important, is the continued evidence of a spirit existing in the minds of the people of Europe, hostile to their despotic forms of Government and friendly to such systems as may procure them the enjoyment of their natural rights. Even in the despotic government of Russia, a post of the soldiery had laid down their arms declaring the discipline too arbitrary. To what extent they had proceeded was not particularly known, as the greatest care was taken to suppress all intelligence touching this subject.

No change of Ministers had taken place in consequence of the acquittal of the Queen. The Morning Chronicle of the 29th Nov. asserts, that the Earl of Liverpool, the Earl of Harrowby, and Mr. Canning, had all tendered their resignations: that Lord Grenville, on account of the state of his health, had declined forming any part of the new Ministry, and that the King had sent for Earl Spencer, to consult with him on the subject. The Courier, published in the evening of the same day, denies all this & remarks that the Whig party "are condemned to toil on in the bleak & barren fields of opposition." It is also asserted in the Chronicle, and denied with equal positiveness in the Courier, that some of the Continental Sovereigns had addressed letters to the King of England, expressive of their alarm lest any change should take place in his Cabinet. "The letter (says the Courier) which the Prince Esterhazy (the Austrian Ambassador) delivered to the King, and upon which such stress is laid in the Morning Chronicle, were mere letters of condolence on the death of the Duchess of York." Parliament was prorogued, by Royal Proclamation (a most unusual mode of proceeding) on the 23d Jan.

The highest honours are paid to the Queen in London wherever she goes.—Thousands follow her exclaiming, "God bless her," "Heaven preserve her." "She must be innocent." On a late visit to St. Paul's Cathedral, 4000 gentlemen escorted her on horseback, with white rosettes in their bosoms.—The crowd was so immense at the Church, that the Queen could not reach her carriage in an hour after the ceremonies of the church were over.

The King of England is called upon in public addresses to dismiss his Ministers.

Meetings have been called in various places to address the Queen on her acquittal. The Court of King's Bench had refused a new trial to Sir Francis Basset; and Major Cartwright, Woodes and others, and obtained a rule to show cause why a new bill should not be granted in their case.

Some military insubordination seems to have broken out in the Russian army; but this, according to the Courier, "had no connection with any political views whatever." In Denmark, a number of arrests were reported to have taken place occasioned by some revolutionary movements, the object of which was to obtain a new constitution and a Representative Government. The King of Spain, on account of bad health, had removed from Madrid; but the people, thinking that he remained too long absent, became clamorous, in consequence of which he promised to return, which calmed the ferment.

By advices to the 13th Nov. from Lisbon, it appears that, owing to the inquietude prevailing in the army and people at the delay of the meeting of the Cortes, it was resolved to adopt the Spanish Constitution at the basis of their future government.

Letters from Rochford, dated 19th Nov. state that M. Hyde De Neuville was to embark the next day for the United States,

from whence he is to proceed to the Brazils as Ambassador.

Accounts from Vienna state that the Austrian army in Italy is to receive a reinforcement of 80,000 men; they add that those energetic measures are more than sufficient not only to put an end to the revolution at Naples, but also to extinguish the revolutionary spirit. The appearance of war increases.

The Courier of the 25th says, "There is no truth whatever in the report circulated on Friday night in the City, and alluded to in the Morning Chronicle of Saturday, of a Naval force having been ordered to be fitted out for the Mediterranean.

On the 20th of Nov. a grand public procession took place at Liverpool, in honour of the Queen's triumphal acquittal.

It appears that his Holiness the Pope, in consequence of the march of Austrian troops into the Papal territory, assembled a conclave of Cardinals and submitted to them the question, whether a representative Constitution should not be granted to the States of the Church.—On a division it was carried against a Constitution by a majority of three.

The Courier Francais says, "The domain of Montgeron, near Paris, has recently been purchased for the Queen of England."

Mr. Professor Young died at Glasgow on the 18th of Nov. in the 74th year of his age.

### LONDON, Nov. 26.

MINISTERS.—Lord Grenville has declared to the King that he could form no party of friends in either House that could strengthen the remnant of the present administration, if left by the Earl of Liverpool, the Earl of Harrowby, and Mr. Canning, who have all tendered their resignation. It is said that the King has sent for Lord Spencer, to consult with him on the formation of a new administration.

### Nov. 27.

Since our last we have received the Paris Journals of Thursday and Friday.

On Wednesday night, an attempt was made to murder the Duke Dacres, Ex-Minister of Marine. The Duke retired to bed about twelve o'clock; shortly after he was blown out upon the floor by an explosion of gunpowder under the mattresses; a second detonation succeeded in a few seconds, and the room was in a flame. The Duke called his valet, who slept in an adjoining cabinet; the latter answered, "I am lost," and instantly jumped from the window into the street, a height of forty feet; his shrieks brought the sentinels to the spot, to whom he declared that some villains had thrown him out of the window. The Duke made his way out of the apartment, and medical aid was immediately procured; it was found that he had the right thigh and arm much burnt. He continues in a suffering state, to the great affliction of the Duchess and his young daughter, but no fears are entertained for his life. The firemen, on examining the apartment, found that several pounds of powder had been deposited between the mattresses, and ignited by means of a train which led under the door. Every thing appeared to justify the suspicion that the valet was the author of this horrible design, particularly when it was discovered that bank bills had been taken from the Duke's writing desk to the amount of 9000 francs. He has since died in the hospital of the injury which he received by his fall from the window.

On Saturday the 17th February, the adjourned meeting of the Central Agricultural Society, was held in the Province Hall.

The Honourable JOHN SAUNDERS, Vice President, in the Chair.

The Vice President opened the meeting by stating, that owing to the state of weather His Excellency was prevented from attending. He then entered into a general statement of the measures pursued by the Directors, and read the report of the Board, which contained a particular account of its transactions.

On the motion of Mr. Botsford, the rules and regulations of the Society were read.

Mr. Botsford then moved, That a Committee of a member from each County be appointed to examine and audit the Secretary's books and the Treasurer's accounts, and report thereon to the next meeting.

Resolved, That Mr. Simonds, Mr. Stubs, Mr. Botsford, Mr. Wetmore, Mr. Scovil, Mr. Miles, Mr. Munro, Mr. Agnew, and Mr. H. Peters, be a Committee for that purpose.

The Society proceeded to the election of officers for the ensuing year, and then adjourned to the next Saturday, and on that day adjourned again until Saturday the 3d March, on which day a General Meeting will be held in the same place, at noon.

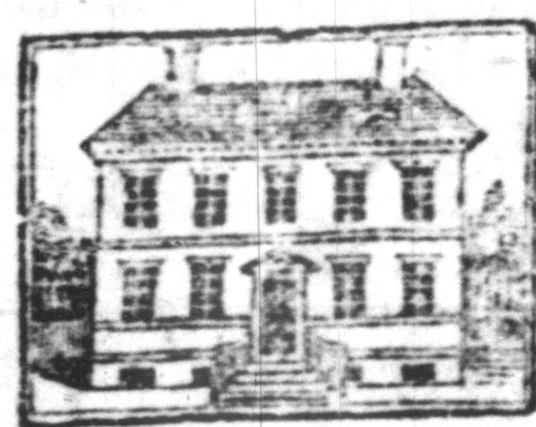
The schr. Calippo, Capt. Tynan, has just arrived in 21 days passage from Barbados.—The Capt. reports that a Packet from England, in 30 days, arrived at Barbados the day before he sailed.—That she brought intelligence of serious disturbances having taken place in London, Greenock, and Manchester, and that at the latter place Twenty one of the Rioters were killed.

London, November 27.

The gazette contains a proclamation, declaring that the Mediterranean passes granted by the governors of Gibraltar and Malta, under the authority of the proclamation of the 20th of November 1819, shall be in force for one year only, from the respective dates of their being used—an order in council suspending the calling out of the London militia for the present year—and an order in council, continuing in force, for 6 months, from the 30th instant, the existing prohibitions and restrictions as to the exportation of gunpowder, arms, &c.
