He was released the evening previous, in consequence of an application to his Honor the President, when every effort was tried to restore his lost reason; but nature was exhausted and he sunk a victim to the unjust sentence of an unjust Court, and a system of extortion practised by His Majesty's Attorney General. Reflect, miserable old man, ere it is too late, upon the objects you have already sacrificed and strive by a future repentance, to save a soul covered with guilt! But more of this anon.

We cannot close this account without noticing the humanity exercised by his Honor the President, by so readily granting the petition for his release.--Globe.

EXTRACT FROM THE
Letter from the Queen to her People,
IN REPLY TO THE ONE FROM THE KING.

"Nothing Extenuate, nor set down aught
in Malice."

BRANDENBURGH-HOUSE, New Year's Day.

To all my Loving Subjects, of whatever denomination, the QUEEN sends her most affectionate Greeting:--

As the King has chosen to address his subjects in the form of a Pamphlet, I am justified in doing so. Situated as I am, I have no other way of making my sentiments known to my faithful People, than through the medium of the Press. The King has his Parliament to which he can appeal, and, in adopting any other method of communicating with his subjects, I humbly conceive he not only derogates from his dignity, but acts contrary to the Statute Law of the realm.

I wish I could for ever blot from my memory the day of my very unfortunate marriage, sacrifice I shall call it, as from that hour I have never known peace or happiness. It could not be supposed that love existed betwixt two persons who had never seen each other until a few days before their marriage; but I had heard so much of the amiable qualities of the Prince of Wales--his gentlemanly carriage--humane disposition, and tenderness to the female sex, that I hoped to pass my life in as much comfort as could be expected, where the union was political, and the inclinations were never consulted.

However I have been deeply disappointed, and to this hour no one knows what I have endured. With the causes of our separation the world are not acquainted, nor can they be by me. Time will remove the veil, and posterity honour me for a silence persisted in from the purest principles of female delicacy.

When I presumed to complain to my family of the treatment I was receiving, my letters, it is well known, were stopped and broken open and the natural appeal of a child to its parent was construed into a want of respect for the husband who had abandoned her in the morning of her youth before she could be charged with the crime of old age.

The silence of my family on this unhappy occasion may readily be accounted for. When the most powerful monarchs of Europe trembled on their thrones, my Father had just reason to dread the loss of his DUKEDOM. Situated in the very centre of the war, he had need of a friend, and in GREAT BRITAIN he found one, whom it was his interest, and the bounden duty he owed to his subjects, not to offend: he thus sacrificed his private affections at the shrine of public interest, and I became the victim of his magnanimity. The grave has long closed over him, and I feel happy he did not live to witness the sufferings his daughter has since endured.

It is well understood that the PRINCE of WALES had for his object in marrying, the nymphs of his debts: if such were actually the case, I was from the first only considered as a piece of parchment, or a stamped receipt, to satisfy his creditors;

can any one doubt then, but that the first wrong was done to me? and that by one of whom,--it is said by the Bishops--"he can do no wrong."

As no crime had even been proved against me, I would have been justified in demanding a restitution of my conjugal rights. This I never thought of, for surely if I am a woman of that "lofty and daring spirit" I am said to be, I would not demean myself by suing in vain to a man who had married me from policy, and deserted me from caprice when his objects was obtained. Besides, I could have no wish to renew a connection with one who did not esteem my person, and whose inclinations he declared were not in his power. Immediately after the separation in 1796, when I was left a "lone woman" in a land of strangers, without one true adviser, I had to form a humble establishment of my own, and amongst my domestics, spies, in spite of every precaution, insinuated themselves; it was to them of no importance what my conduct was. They had only to calumniate me, and to do so with some feasibility, it was necessary they should be near my person.

I shall say little of the Investigation in 1806, carried back, like the last, for several years; it is only to name the Douglasses, to shew that I was innocent, falsely and foully calumniated. If an error in the conduct of the Princess of Wales be a crime against the nation, is it not equally so in the Prince? I have been acquitted of all errors, while others have acknowledged their's, and yet are passed over with impunity.

A Proclamation.

WHEREAS the General Assembly of this Province stands prorogued to Wednesday the sixth of this instant June: I have thought fit further to prorogue the said General Assembly, and the same is hereby prorogued to the first Wednesday in September next ensuing.

Given under my Hand and Seal, at Fredericton, the second day of June, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and twenty-one, and in the second year of His Majesty's Reign.

Extract of a letter from William Ewing, Esq. to a Merchant in this town,

APRIL 28, 1821.

"On the other side you have a copy of a letter from a friend of mine in Liverpool, to whom I sent the draft on William Ledden & Co. for the purpose of procuring acceptance--and as is customary, the Bill was left to be called for next day, and when called for, Ledden declared it was lost or mislaid--but said if another copy was sent, he would accept it. Not having another copy at the time, I wrote Mr. Ker that Ledden & Co. must either produce the draft or pay the money, and to take steps against him without delay, which led to what you will see stated in the annexed letter.

"I would strongly recommend that you make the circumstance I have here related, public both at Fredericton and St. John.

Extract of a letter from William Ker, Liverpool, to William Ewing, Esq. Glasgow.

"It was not until after many fruitless attempts both at his counting house and house to see Mr. Ledden, that my Solicitor and I surprised him in bed--he at first denied ever having seen the draft upon him, but the threat to send this evening for a special writ for him, if it was not produced before 4 o'clock, brought it forth about an hour before the time, and I now enclose it accepted. His house and office are at least a mile and a half from the Exchange, and we had repeated journeys to both, ere we could see him, for no steps at law could be taken, till after a personal demand of him to surrender the Bill had been made, and this he was aware of, and no doubt kept out of our way on purpose."

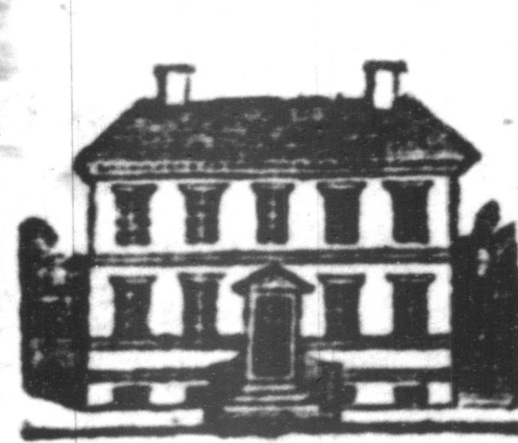
