The ceremonies there, it is expected will not be over before 5 o'clock.

Not the slightest accident has as yet happened, that we know of, though the assembled multitude exceeded every thing we have seen of late years. The whole business of the morning has gone off in a manner highly gratifying to every loyal heart in the realm. Peace, order, and tranquillity were the prevailing features of the whole scene, and we trust the proceedings of the day will terminate in a manner reflecting credit upon the character and conduct of this enlightened nation.

11TH SEPTEMBER, 1821.

By the Mail that arrived here yesterday from Halifax, we are put in possession of London dates to the 19th of July, the Coronation was then proceeding, as will be seen by the extracts given in this paper. The Halifax Free Press contains the Order of Procession, which is two lengthy for insertion in this day's Publication, we will give it in our next.

ONE OF THE PEOPLE.

A letter from London, dated July 19, States:—"The following military reductions to be in contemplation—7th Dragoon Guards; 18th and 19th Light Dragoons; the 92d, 93d, and Ceylon regiment to be disbanded—A reduction of one major, two captains, two lieutenants, two ensigns—and two companies, from every regiment in the service; together with all the second captains of the Royal Artillery—estimated, on the whole, at 25,000 men."

DIED. On Friday, at two o'clock, Mr. CALB WARD, in the 43d year of his age, after a short illness of 9 days. Few men have died in this place more sincerely and more generally lamented.
On Sunday morning, after a short but severe illness, Mrs. ELIZA WARD, wife of Mr. CHARLES WARD, in the 28th year of her age. Both funerals took place on Monday, after a few hours of interval, attended by many afflicted relatives, and a large assemblage of acquaintances and friends.

Arrived on Thursday last, brig Victory, Captain

Gray, Kingston, Jam. On the 6th August, off the Havana, was boarded by a ship under Spanish colours, said by the crew to be La Fleur de la Mar, Captain Dannel, which took possession of all the papers and letters, overhauled the vessel for money and found 900 dollars. They then collected all the small rigging and spare sails in order to take them away, took the money and papers on board the ship, leaving the sails, &c. In a short time returned, in search of more money, when they emptied the crews' chests, stripped the master, and threatened to take the cook on board the ship; went again to their vessel, where they remained for some time. In about two hours they returned, bringing with them all the money, letters, &c. (which they had previously opened) and almost every other article taken out of the brig; gave them to the master, demanded a receipt for the same, and departed without further molestation. Just previous to their return with the money, &c. a ship and brig were in sight in the direction of the Havana, supposed to be British men of war, which no doubt induced them to relinquish their plunder. The ship kept to windward of the brig, the remainder of the day, with a view probably of paying her a second visit during the night, but fortunately a heavy squall coming on, they parted, and Capt. Gray saw no more of her.

While in sight, about two hours previous to being overhauled, they saw the ship board another vessel, which by their information was an Am. brig, that had been previously fallen in with by a pirate, (felucca rigged) manned by a mixture of Spaniards, Portuguese, Italians, and Americans or Englishmen, who plundered them of every thing on board, and afterwards cut the rigging to pieces so as to disable them from reaching any port to give the alarm.
Aug. 7—Fell in with the brig *Aeolus*, Captain Kelly, of Yarmouth, N.S. who sailed from Kingston the day before the *Victory*, from whom they got the following information:

That a few days previous they were boarded close under the land by a small felucca rigged vessel, who brought their arms in a boat from the shore, and afterwards came on board the brig. On boarding Captain Kelly, they told him they had advices from Kingston, of the time of his sailing, and of the quantity of money on board, of which an unsuccessful demand was made. After threatening the lives of the crew generally in case the money should be found, (having denied there was any in the vessel) they took the crew of the brig on board the pirate two at a time, and by menaces and threats endeavoured to gain information where the money was hidden. We cannot here omit to mention, to the credit of the crew of the *Aeolus*, that there was money on board to the knowledge of the whole; but that all the threats and abuses they received did not induce them to betray the trust reposed in them, although their lives were often put in jeopardy, by the villains sticking the ends of their cutlasses in their breasts as far as the bone, &c. The pirates then took the Capt. on board, and desired the mate to proceed on his voyage, as they said it was intended to take his (the Captain's) life. Finding all the means they had used for the discovery of the money fruitless, they brought the Captain back, and run the vessel into shoal water, with the intention to put her ashore, where the bottom would beat out, when, if there was any cash on board, they would then find it. However not deeming it prudent to approach the shore too near from the fear of losing themselves, they anchored the brig in ten feet water, where they ordered the ballast to be shifted, tore all the cabin to pieces, took the bungs out of the water and other casks on board, and completely ransacked the vessel, without finding any more money than 80 dollars, which they took out of the Captain's desk—they then permitted him to proceed on his voyage.

While those wretches were on board the *Aeolus*, they informed Captain K. that the crew consisted of persons who had been in the Spanish service, and were ill used by the Americans who composed the crews of privateers under the Patriot flag; and that it was their intention if ever they fell in with an American vessel, to put the crew to death.
