LATEST FROM ENGLAND

The ship Robert Edwards, Sherburne, has arrived at New-York, from London, bringing dates to the and Jan. it does not appear that she is the bearer of any news of importance, Russia and Turkey, had not measured swords as yet; nor does it appear that their differences had been adjusted. The New-York Advocate furnishes the following Summary of the contents of the papers, brought by this arrival.

The Greeks continued every where successful, and it would seem, from the backwardness of the Turks to renew their attacks, that the Divan is apprehensive of the former being able to maintain their Independence.

An article in the Gazette de France, of Jan. 18, states, that a letter had been received from Odessa, bearing date Dec. 22d in v not it was said, "since the arrival of the last news mi Constantinople, which reached to December 13, that on the 3d Nov, the Divan demanded, through the medium of the Ambassador of Austria and England, a delay of thirty days to decide definitively as to the Russian white timatum. This news had inspired people here with new hopes of peace?"

The Nuremburg correspondent repeats the report that the Persians had gained an important victory over the Pacha of Bagdad.

The news from the Morea confirms the accounts previously received of the success of the Greeks and the retreat of the Turks into their fortresses which are vigorously besieged. Prince Demeritus Y psilanti had been nominated Chief of the Greek States; twenty-five Senators have been elected to represent the principal towns. The seat of government will be at Tripolizza.

Smyrna, which has been the theatre of such scenes of blood, is now tranquil, and commerce has resumed its activity.

A body of Greeks, amounting to 1300 or 2000, are said to have embatked on board merchant vessels at Samos, with the intention of attacking Scio, and delivering it from the oppression of the Turks.

Letters have been received from Corfu, which state that all the towns of the Peloponnessus, except Coron, are in the hands of the Greeks; even Arta has yielded to their arms, which now triumph, not only in the Peloponnessus, but in Thessaly, and in all Epirus, as well as Cassandra.

Paris, Jan. 9.

It has been rumoured for several days past, that Viscount Chateaubriand will succeed M. Decazes, as Ambasador at the Court of England.—Quotidienne.

Odessa, Dec. 16. We have received letters from Constantinople which come down to the oth inst. After having received the inemorial of Lord Strangford, which took place after several conferences with the Reis Effendi, the Turkish Ministers suddenly changed there tone and sentiments, which are of a more conciliatory nature than they had been at the commencement of November. It is thus that we must rectify the pretended Declaration of the Divan, wall the Foreign Ministers, which, it was said here, had been distributed at Pera, and in which the Porte announced that it would not accept the ultimatum of Russia.

Lord Strangford now exercises much greater influence than heretofore, and negociations have, for the second time, been deferred to a very limited interval. A pacific arrangement, however, is viewed by a large majority as a very difficult thing; the change in the tone of the Ministers is attributed to different motives, which are publicly circulated. — Universal Gazette.

Liverpool, Jan. 29.—The celebrated Sir Humphrey Davy, is at present on a visit to Sir Michael Shaw Stewart, at Ardgowan, near Greenock.

A superb cloak of the Highland costume is at present preparing in Edinburgh, for the King of Persia, by direct orders from that Monarch.

HALIFAX

By the arrival of the Irene from Pernambuco, we learn that from 150 to 200,000 barrels of Merce santable Fish are required for the Brazils alone. The American, (U.S.) Fish, has got quite into Esrepute, being of a worse quality the last year than heretofore. The Nova-Scoula Fish are preferred even to Newfoundland, particularly those from Cape Breton.

LONDON, JAN. 20. The Paris Journals of Thursday reached town yesterday, by express. In the Chamber of Deputies on the preceding day, the discussions were vehoment, and marked by the intemperate conduct towards the Ministry which is prevalent; but they are of little interest out of France. The Chevalier Mascanubas, in quality of Charge d'Affaires for Portugal, has been presented to his Majesty. From the east of Europe, it is stated that the Greeks of Cossandra, who lately were defeated there, have resumed offensive measures on the arrival of a reinforcement in the Gulf of Contessa, and have advanced to Panomi, a place about 15 leagues distent from Salonica. Measures seem to be taking for the evacuation of Wallachia and Moldavia by the Turkish troops but some letters assert that this is not with pacific intentions, but for the sake of taking up a stronger position on the Danube
