During the whole of this painful trial he lay in a supine position, and gradually wasted away until he became a perfect skeleton. On the twenty-fifth day the vital spark became extinct, and his soul fled its tenement of clay—we humbly hope to find that repose in another world, which was denied to it in this."

A MERMAID.

An American shipmaster from this port, says the Boston Evening Gazette, became the fortunate purchaser, some months ago, in the Islands of Java, of a preserved Mermaid, which had been brought to Batavia by a Japanese, and was supposed to have been taken on the coast of one of the Japan Isles. The fish had become perfectly dry, and was originally, it is thought, about four feet in length. From a gentleman who lately saw the specimen, we learn that the descriptions given in old books of natural history, and the representations frequently seen in old drawings of the Mermaid, are fully confirmed by this rare and perhaps unexampled preparation. The head is covered with light colored hair, coarser than human hair. The upper part of the face resembles a man's, but the lower part approaches the monkey's. The nose is flat like an African negro. From the upper jaw of a very wide mouth, descends two tusks passing over the lower lip; but the rest on both jaws are very like human teeth. The cheeks are wrinkled, from the dissipated state of the skin, and the eyes are deeply sunk in the sockets. The shape of the bust is precisely like the configuration of a woman; below which, the body gradually becomes scaly, and tapering by degrees, terminates in a fish's tail. There are four fins on the lower part of the body, and the extremity of the tail is forked.

This curiosity was exhibited at the Cape of Good Hope, and submitted to the inspection of several naturalists from England, who entirely concurred in the opinion that this is an example of the Mermaid, whose existence has been generally held to be fabulous. The owner is proceeding to Europe, and we may soon expect to hear of its arrival in England.

LONDON. House of Commons, July 24.—A bill passed the Committee of Ways and Means, for the issue of £16,500,000, to complete the aid of the year 1822.

BOSTON, SEPT. 3. Fever in New York. Four new cases of yellow fever were reported on Friday last, and four on Saturday. The evening Post of Saturday, contains an alphabetical list of between seven & eight hundred removals which have been made since the commencement of the fever.

The Turks might be easily expelled from Europe, as their number is stated at only 1,200,000, of whom, 400,000 are supposed to be in Constantinople.

At Algiers upwards of 50 persons died a day of the plague, at the last dates.

A postscript of a letter dated St. Peterburgh, 14th July, received by the Corinna, is as follows:—"The Imperial Guard (40,000) is upon its march back to this city, and expected in a few days.—Nobody here anticipates a war.

LONDON, JULY 19. Extract of a letter received this morning from Paris, dated Monday evening last.

"The French Government has just concluded a contract for 10,000 horses for the artillery, &c. All the different officers have been ordered to their posts, and the Con-

scripts of the year, 1821, are ordered to join the army. If this does not look like war I don't know what does."

We have received Lisbon papers to the 6th inst. The debates in the Cortes upon the question of the Brazils, had been long and vehement. We are strongly of opinion, however, that whatever decisions they may come to, will have little influence on the other side of the Atlantic. The fate of the Brazils is determined. They have two many examples of independence around them, to permit that they should remain in subjection, and Portugal is as little able as Spain to enforce her authority.
