Speaking as he does from his own feelings, he must be correct—at least with regard to himself; and therefore I hope that Government will be wise in time, and let this Province be new modelled, by making the Laws and Ecclesiastical Polity, half Scotch and half English; or otherwise send us a Governor with a Head and Heart half Scotch and half English, and not leave the Ecclesiastical affairs (as the learned Author delicately expresses himself) "to the private partialities or national feeling of the Officer administering the Government of the Country."—Ecclesiastical Polity, p. 59.
