London, May 16.—The ship James Croppet, from New-York for Liverpool, has been spoken off the Old Head of Kinsale: Colonel Barclay and Mr. Chipman, are passengers on board her.

Quebec, June 21.—An answer, it is reported, has been received by the Speaker of the Assembly, from Joseph Marryatt, Esquire, declining to accept the Agency for this Province, on account of the appointment coming from one branch of the Legislature only.

POSTSCRIPT.

Union of the Two Provinces.—Since writing the foregoing remarks we have been assured that the intimation contained in the Quebec Mercury of Tuesday last, relative to the union of the Two Provinces is correct, at least so far as relates to the determination of government to submit the measure to the consideration of the Legislature. The Bill is drafted.

Saint Andrews, June 18.

We understand that His Excellency Major General GEORGE STRACAY SMYTH, Lieutenant Governor and Commander in Chief of this Province, is expected here about the 25th inst.—It is probable that Sir JAMES KEPPLE, Lieutenant Governor and Commander in Chief in and over the Province of NOVA SCOTIA, and its dependencies, will arrive at the same time. The visit of those distinguished Personages, will afford the highest gratification to all classes of His Majesty's loyal subjects in this County.

London, May 18.—Private accounts intimate that there exists considerable irritation between the French and Spanish Governments; and that the latter have demanded that the French army be withdrawn immediately from the Spanish frontiers.

IRELAND.—Lord Liverpool declared yesterday, that it was not the intention of Government to renew the Habeas Corpus Suspension Bill; but that a motion would be made in the other House for continuing the Insurrection Act.

Kingston, Jan. April 29.—The brig Neptune, Smith, from this port for St. John, N. B. has been boarded and robbed, off Cape Antonio, of 6000 dollars, by a piratical vessel.

HALIFAX, JUNE 24.—A London paper of the 18th May was brought by the Brunswick.—It has not furnished any intelligence of much moment. In the Commons, a Bill, introduced by Mr. Canning, for allowing Roman Catholic Peers seats in the House of Lords, had been passed.—A Bill, we are happy to observe, was also before Parliament providing employment for the labouring Poor of Ireland, and had been twice read. The Colonial Trade Bill was read a second time.

A Copy of the Navigation Bill before Parliament, has been received, and we lament it was not in our power to procure it for publication. We understand it authorises British ships to import into His Majesty's Colonies, Plantations and Islands in America, or the West-Indies, from any Port in Europe, or Africa, from Gibraltar, the Island of Eliza and its Dependencies, Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney or Sark, certain enumerated articles—and to

export to said ports, in like manner, all articles, the growth, produce or manufacture of the Colonies, and all articles legally imported into them. No vessel, we understand, will be admitted into any part of H. M. Colonies, coming from Foreign Ports, where the same privilege is not allowed to the vessels of said Colonies.

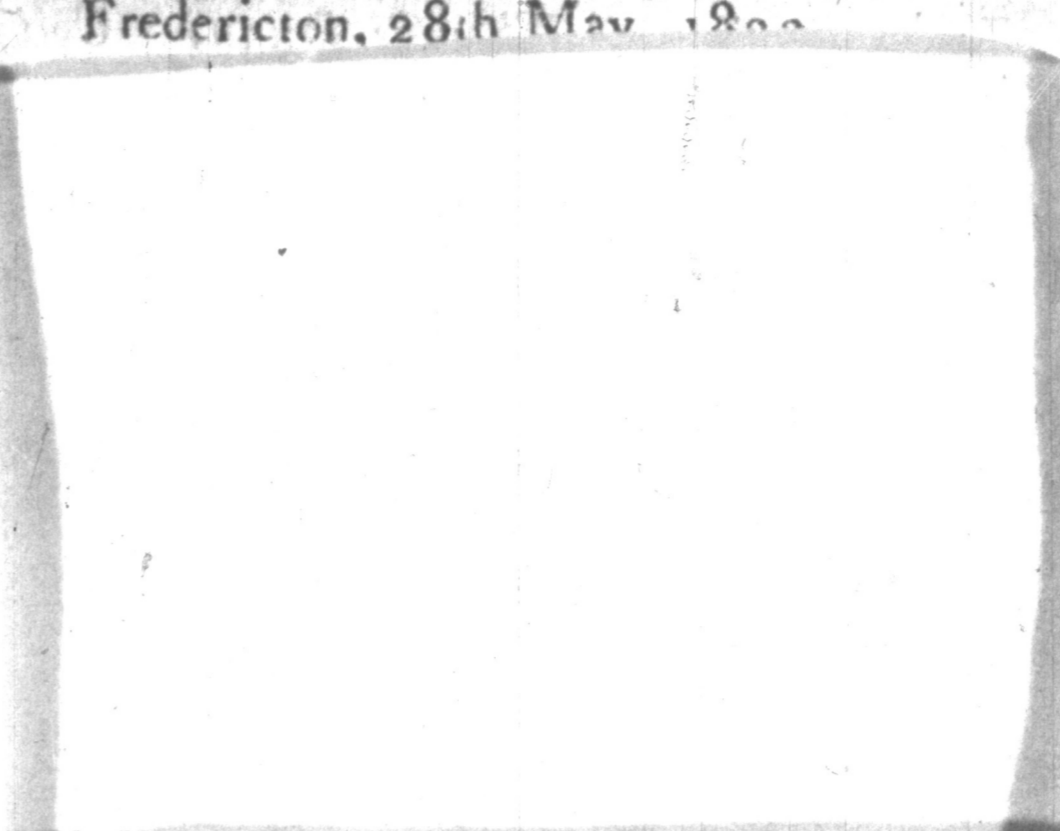
