

each. I proceed this afternoon to the neighbourhood of Culsicully, and the Islands near Shabazpoor, from the latter only partial reports have been received of their disasters, but from the former I am concerned to say, there has been positive accounts received this day from the Thanadar, stating that about twelve thousand people are already ascertained to be lost in that Thanah alone, which is in addition to those I have already reported, and many of the remaining inhabitants are still living upon grain that was wet and dried again, which it is to be feared will cause much sickness.

The Thanadar states that the loss of cattle and property is beyond his power to estimate, but mentions 20,000 cattle as being about the number which is much more likely than some of the attempts I have seen to describe the losses, but the loss of people has been ascertained by their names.

The following on the same subject is from the India Gazette of yesterday.

In the quarter of the Thanah division of Gurmudde, northward of Barrisaul, great loss of lives and in property had been sustained, as may be seen by the following aggregate:

WHEREAS in and by the Act of Parliament passed in the third year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act to regulate the Trade between His Majesty's Possessions in America and the West Indies, and other Places in America," and the West Indies, there is no permission granted for the Importation into this Province, of Dead Meats of any kind: All Persons concerned are therefore hereby notified, that the Importation of Dead Meats of all kinds, from the United States of America, into this Province, is prohibited: And any such Articles imported or brought into this Province from the said United States, after the date hereof, will be proceeded against as Articles illegally Imported.

Whereof all Persons concerned will take due notice, and govern themselves accordingly.
