

Islands or Colonies, subject to such reciprocal rules and restrictions as the President of the United States might, by such Proclamation, make and publish, any thing in the laws intitled "An Act concerning Navigation," or an Act intitled "An Act supplementary to an Act concerning Navigation," to the contrary notwithstanding.

And, whereas, satisfactory evidence has been given to the President of the United States, that the ports herein-after named, in Islands or Colonies in the West Indies, under the dominion of Great Britain, have been opened to the vessels of the United States, that is to say—[here follows a list of the Free Ports.]

Now, therefore, I, James Monroe, President of the United States of America, do hereby declare and proclaim, that the Ports of the United States shall hereafter, and until the end of the next session of the Congress of the United States, be open to the vessels of Great Britain employed in the trade and intercourse between the U. States and the Islands and Colonies hereinbefore named; any thing in the laws, intitled "An Act concerning Navigation," or an act, intitled "An Act supplementary to an Act concerning Navigation," to the contrary notwithstanding under the following reciprocal rules and restrictions, namely:—

To vessels of Great Britain, bona fide British built, owned, and the master and three-fourths of the mariners of which, at least, shall belong to Great-Britain; or any United States' built ship or vessel which has been sold to, and become the property of British subjects; such ship or vessel being also navigated with a master and three-fourths of the mariners, at least, belonging to Great Britain: And provided always, That no articles shall be imported into the United States in any such British ship or vessel, other than articles of the growth, produce, or manufacture of the British Islands and Colonies in the West Indies, when imported in British vessels coming from any such Island or Colony, and articles of the growth, produce, or manufacture, of the British Colonies in North America, or of the Island of Newfoundland, in vessels coming from the port of Saint John's, in that Island, or from any of the aforesaid ports of the British Colonies in North America.
