ST ANDREWS, Dec. 25.

An Inquest was held on the 19th instant, on the body of George Marshall, a man dispatched by Assistant-Commissary-General Price, of Saint John, with letters to Mr. Folsom, Publisher of the East-Port Sentinel. Verdict of the Jury—Died by fatigue.

It appeared by the evidence of Mr. Lockray, of St. Andrews, who had travelled in company with the deceased, on foot, that they had left Masquash after taking breakfast, and travelled without any refreshment till within three miles of Little's Inn, when the deceased first shewed symptoms of failing; that Mr. Lockray then took his bundle, which was quite a heavy one, and sometime after the deceased requested him to take his own coat, which he had travelled in the whole day—at the same time he began to complain of pain in his side, frequently falling; that Mr. Lockray then put his arm round him, and tried to assist him in that manner, till finding his own strength exhausted, he quitted him, and made all haste to Mr. Little's for assistance.

Mr. Little's evidence was, that he found the deceased within half a mile of his house in the state above described—that he did not consider him in any way dangerous when he first got to him; that he merely complained of fatigue, and begged to be allowed to rest himself where he then was. With the assistance of Mr. Lockray, and a man he had brought with them, they attempted getting him to the house, but had not proceeded but a few yards before he expired in their arms.

The Editors of the Herald are requested to make the circumstances relating to his death public, as it fully appeared to the Jury, by several witnesses examined, some who had passed them on the road, that Mr. Lockray had used every exertion in his power to assist the deceased.
