He was repeatedly called by the suffrages of the inhabitants of Charlotte, to represent them in the General Assembly of this Province, where he evinced an independent spirit, and acted for the good of his constituents.

London, May 6.

A private letter from Paris says—"The

chief topic of conversation here at present is the conflagrations in the neighbourhood of Meaux. Those fires, though blazing over some extent of country, are involved in profound obscurity—it is now nearly two months that they have been going on. The perpetrators commenced with setting fire to the corn-mills, then to the cottages of the unfortunate peasantry, nearly two hundred of which have been burned to the ground; and it is said that an attempt has been made within the last ten days to set fire to the town of Meaux. The peasants in that neighbourhood, men, women, and children, are on the watch every night, and yet the fires take place. Who the incendiaries are, or what their object can be, is to this moment an impenetrable mystery.
