LONDON, MARCH 8. The Parliamentary history of the past week is remarkable, chiefly for the defeat sustained by Ministers on the evening of Friday last. The question was the reduction of the two Junior Lords of the Admiralty. Sir Matthew White Ridley, who usually votes with Government, objected to that item of the supply which provides for six Lords, and proposed that four should be the number. Ministers exerted themselves in vain in favour of the establishment; for it was declared to be a subject involving not so much the value of the particular saving, which was bu small, but the principle of reducing every office which could possibly be dispensed with in the public service. The house recognised the necessity of adopting this principle, and the amendment was carried by 182 against 128, being a majority against Ministers of 54. This result has created the greatest sensation both in and out of the house.

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Early on Monday evening, the Chancelfor of the Exchequer gave an explanation of his arrangements for remitting one shilling duty on malt. In consequence of the time for taking off the duty being fixed so late as the 5th July, the Malisters have hitherto forborne to make any purchase in Barley, to the great injury of the growers and holders of that article; in consideration of which, the Chancellor of the Exchequer has applied the effectual remedy of causing the duty to cease on the 26th Feb. instead of the later period originally proposed.

On the same evening the Army Estimates were brought forward by Lord Palmerston. He stated that a reduction was proposed of above 12.000 men, and of consequent expenditure of upwards of £500,000: Mr. Hume and Mr. Bennett, of course, opposed the proposition, and contended that not only 20,000 men should be reduced, but also that the reduction made was made in the worst manner. The House thought otherwise, and Lord Palmerston's motion was carried by a Majority of 196 to 51.

A sound mird in a sound body, is a full description of a happy state. He that has these two, has little more to wish-for; and he that wants either of them, will be little the better for any thing else. Mens happiness or misery is of their own making. He, whose mind directs not wisely, will nevertake the right way; he, whose body is crazy and feeble, will never be able to advance in it. There are some Mens consututions of body and mind so vigorous, and well fram'd by nature, that they need hor assistance from others, by the strength of there natural genius, they are 'from the'r cradles carried towards what is excellent; and by the privilege of their happy constitutions, are able to do wonders. Examples of this kind are few. and I may say, that of all the men we meet with, rithe parts of ten are what they are, good or evil, useful or not, by their education. 'Tis that which makes the great difference in mankind. The little, or almost insensible impressions on our tender infancies, have very important and lasting consequences: And there 'as, as in the fountains of some rivers, where a gentle application of the hand turns the flexible waters into channels, that make them take contrary courses; and by whis intle direction given them at first in the source, they receive different tendencies, and arrive at very remote and distant places.

I imagine the minds of children as castly turn'd this cribat way, as water: And though this be the principle part, and our care should be about the inside, yet the clay-conage is not to be neglected. I shall therefore begin with the case, and consider first the health of the body, as that which perhaps you may rather expect from that study I have been thought more peculiarly to have apply'd my self to; and that also which will be soonest dispatch'd, as lying in a very little compass.

How necessary health is to our business and happiness; and how requisite a strong constitution, able to endure hardships and fatigue, is to one that will make any figure in the world, is too obvious to need any proof.
