A gendeman who was present at the barrle of Leipsic, told me a humorous anecdote, which may serve to illustrate the above position. After the signal defeat of the French at this memoral le action, Leipsic became full of a mixed medley of soldiers of all arms, and of all nations; of course a great variety of coin was in circulation; a British private, who was attached to the rocket brigade, and who had picked up a little broken French and German, went to the largest hotel in Leipsic, and displaying an English

shilling to the landlord, inquired if this piece of coin was current there. Oh yes, replied he, you may have whatever the house affords for that money, it passes current here at present. Our unfortunare Bardolph, finding himself in such compliant quarters, called about him most Justily, and the most sumptuous dinner the house could afford, washed down by sundry bottles of the most expensive wines, was dispatched without ceremony. On going away he tendered at the bar the identical shilling which the landlord had madvertently led him to expect was to perform such wonders. The stare, the shrug, and the exclamation elicited from " mine host of the garter," by such a tender, may be more easily conceived than expressed. An explanation very much to the dissatisfaction of the landlord took place, who quickly found, not only that nothing more was likely to be got, but also that the laugh would be tremendously heavy against him. This part of the profits he had a very christian wish to divide with his neighbour. Taking, therefore, his guest to the street door of his hotel, he requested him to look over the way. of Lord Kennedy's great match for 2000 guineas, took place on Monday the 12th of August. His Lordship had taken 40 to 1. in lifties, that he would one day, of season 1822, from 12 o'clock of one night to 12 o'clock the following night, kill 40 brace of grouse, on his shooting ground at Felar, at the head of Aberdeenshire; and afterwards rice to his seat at Dunnotter, and back to Felor, a distance of 140 miles. Exactly at 12-o'clock on Sunday night, three watches were ser together, and put in a box by the umpires. - Turner, Esq. on the part of Mr. Farquitarson, and Capt. Barclay, on the part of Lord Kennedy: Mr. Cumining ref ree. At 4 in the moruing, Lord Kennedy commenced shooting. attended by a great body of Highlanders, drawn together from curtosity. A great deal of rain had fallen in the night, which made the hills very wet, and made the birds wild. The first was killed at a quarter after four, and the whole forty brace in four hours after and 41 minutes. After shifting his wet clothes and taking some refreshment, he mounted his horse and started for Dunnetter, where he arrived at 2 o'clock; having rode the 70 miles in four hours and a half. He remained there about an hour, and got back to Felar fair minutes before eight o'clock at night, performing the 140 miles in ten hours and 26 minutes, and winning the much by four hours and four minutes. The whole was done, shooting, riding, &c. in 15 hours and 56 minutes. He returned to Castletown that night, a distance of 14 miles, by 10 o'clock : making the whole distance on horseback 154 miles-His Lordship did not appear fatigued - Every

thing was against him; the grouse are uncommon strong and forward this season;
the road is any thing but good—the first
four miles a mere mountain sheep tract, and
the remainder very hard and stony, with
namerous short sharp hills.—London paper.

BOSTON. Oct. 23.

So numerous are the piracies committed by the ruffians at Cape Antonio, that to publash entire the particulars of their enormines, would occupy too much of our paper. They are repetitions of the robbery of vessels, and of such cruelty towards the defenceless mariners, as to those, the particulars of which have been published. Information of the plunder, &c. of the following, have been received since our last: Brig Hannah, Clements, of Philadelphia; Danish schooner Atert, Ingles, from Vera Cruz, for Saint Thomas; schooner Bee, Johnson, of Charleston, burnt; brig Ardent, Jones, of Grenada; French ship Venus, from Bourdeaux; brig Vittoria, of London; brig Industry, of Montego Bay, and a Danish ship; two American brigs, a schooner, and an English sloop, whose names are not given.

The Rebecca, of Portland, arrived at Havannah, 6th instant. A piratical sch'r of 9 guns, prize to the Peacock, arrived same day, taken on the North side of Cuba, while in the act of engaging a small British Government schooner, on the New Providence station; but the crew, except four, all made their escape to the shore. The Peacock was said to have sent another piratical schooner to Pensacola, and to have burnt 3 others. A lever from Havanna, October 5, received in this city, says, that the King's schooner rescued, was the Speedwell, and that she had arrived the day before, with accounts that the Peacock had captured 5 or 6 pirates, near Bahia Honda.

The brig Victory, of London, a captured ve sel, lays, with impunity, inside the Co. lorados, as a store ship, where she has been for upwards of six weeks. Her cargo of coffice was put into bags, carried to Havannah, in launches, in open day, and soid. An information having been ledged against part of it, proceedings were instituted by an Alcade, when a person by the name of Barrado, came forward, and swore that the property was his, that he bought it from one Bernal, a physician, who swore in his turn, that he had it from Montes de Aca, a surgeon, and this last swore it grew upon his estate! It is thus that justice is evaded in Havannah.

Private letters from New-Orleans, of the 25th and 27th ult. state that between 7 and 800 had died from the 1st of September up to the last date. On the 24th there were 600 cases reported to the Board of Health; and it was supposed that about 1200 of those who were considered liable to take the fever, yet remained. Of one vessel from this port, 14 of the crew had fallen victims.
