SAINT JOHN, Nov. 9.

Melancholy occurrence.—We are grieved to relate that, on Thursday night last, as Mr. WILLIAM STANTON, chief mate of the ship Prince Regent, was proceeding from the Cabin to set the watch, his foot struck the cable, which caused him to fall headlong into the after hatchway, and that his death was the immediate consequence. Mr. S. was in his 30th year, and was the 5th son of Mr. Benjamin Stanton of this city. His loss is much regretted by his friends and acquaintance.

We hear from St. Andrews that CHRISTOPHER SCOTT, Esq. has very liberally come forward and offered to finish at his own expense the Scotch Church lately founded in that Town, and to build a commodious brick house as a Manse or Clergyman's residence. From the very extensive and handsome scale on which the Church has been commenced and the favorable site to which has been found for it, it may be expected to prove an ornament to the Town, as well as a commodious place of worship for a large portion of the community. This is an instance of generosity and public spirit which has never been equalled in the Province, and it is not the first which has been recorded of the same individual. Not many months have elapsed since he in conjunction with JOHN DUNN, Esq. erected a Parsonage in the Town of St. Andrews, which shall remain as a memorial of kind regard to the victims of disease and indigence, when the benevolent donors shall be gathered to their fathers.—Star.

The St. John's Newfoundland Royal Gazette of the 15th ultimo, states that, on Saturday last the flag of His Excellency Vice Admiral Sir Charles Hamilton, was shifted from his Majesty's ship Sir Francis Drake to his Majesty's ship Valorous, in which vessel they understood His Excellency would sail for England next day: His embarkation was appointed to take place that afternoon at 2 o'clock.

Large quantities of cotton thread are continually shipped from England to France. A pound of American cotton, purchased for about a quarter of a dollar, after passing through the English machines, commands over 29 dollars in France.

It is said that Bermuda will be greatly depressed, under the present Colonial Acts, as it must lose nearly the whole of the American Trade—hitherto affording considerable profit—and for which it has no equivalent from any quarter.

Apprehensions appear to be entertained of disturbances in Ireland among the Wicklow Tenantry of Lord Fitzwilliam, on account of the high rents. It is said 50,000 acres pay £36,400 per ann.

It is suggested an act of Congress may be expected, to reduce the tonnage on British ships from the Colonies.

It appears that Flour from the United States will be received into the interior of Canada, free of duty, till the act regulating the internal trade arrives from England.

The act to regulate the trade of Upper and Lower Canada, was published in the Quebec Gazette of the 14th inst.

The arrivals at Quebec the present season, up to the 14th instant, were 550 vessels and 10,455 settlers.
