LATEST FROM ENGLAND.

By the arrival this morning of the fast sailing ship Robert Fulton, Captain Hold. ridge, in 37 days from Liverpool, our London files to the 22d of September have come to hand. Their contents continue to leave us still in doubt as to the more important relations of continental Europe, although there is no want of intelligence to serve as tood for conjecture.

England: The Bank of England has declared a half yearly dividend of five per cent. On the question being, at the meeting of proprietors, put to the Governor, whether the present profits of the Bank jusrified, the dividend, he replied in substance in the affirmative, although he conceded that, with all other institutions, the business of this Bank had diminished since the peace.

The revenue of the kingdom for the current quarter, it was apprehended, would fall short of the estimates three or four hundred thousands pounds. There was no do bt of its deficiency, as compared with the corresponding quarter of the preceeding year.

Of the King, nothing is mentioned; nor do we notice any thing respecting the Ministry, other than a rumour that the office of Secretary of War was to be abolished; that the present incumbent (Lord Palmerston) was to retire on a pension equal to haif the empluments of his office. Lord Melville was spoken of as the successor to Mr. Canning as Governor General of India, and the Duke of Buckingham as the successor of Lord M. at the head of the Admiralty.

The Parliamentary Interest of the Hertford Family was to be revived, not having been exercised by the late possessor of the title. The present Marquis lately succeeded to a revenue of 130,000 pounds ster. ling, and commands thirteen votes in the House of Commons.
