WEST INDIA COLONIES.

There can be no doubt that a commercial communication is intended to be opened betwixt our West-India Colonies, South America, the U. S. and the north of Europe, the South of which may be considered as already open to them. A Bill is immediately to be brought into Parliament for that important purpose. Doubts have been expressed about Foreign ships from the Baltic for instance, being admitted to go to our Islands. If the trade is open to the Baltic at all, we can see no reason why the ships from the countries adjoining should be prevented, while Americans are allowed to go from the United States. We confess, however, that the more we reflect upon the subject, the more we are convinced that there will be considerable limitations and restrictions in the intercourse contemplated, both in the produce to be taken away from the Islands and the articles to be brought back. Sugar, for instance, we should suppose would not be permitted to be carried away in American or any other foreign ships. The returns also, we apprehend, will be confined to provisions, lumber staves, and other articles of a similar nature. A few days will, however, clear up this subject, which is one of great interest, and must lead to important results.

We have heard from a source of intelligence on which we can rely, that His Majesty is not to honour Scotland with his presence this summer.

MARCH 23.

On Wednesday evening Mr. Marryat presented a petition to the house of commons, from the Inhabitants of Grenada, complaining of the dreadful state of distress in which the West-India Planters are placed. Mr. Wilmot observed, that next week he intended to bring forward some new measures, regulating the trade between the Colonies and the Mother Country, which we presume is intended to benefit the former. It is now understood, that British ships only, will be allowed to carry sugar to the Baltic, under the regulations contemplated for opening the trade between the North of Europe and the West-India Colonies.

At a meeting of the West-India Merchants and planters, held in the London Tavern, on Friday last, it was carried to present a Petition to Parliament, approving of the scheme proposed by Government, for opening the trade to the West-India Colonies. This scheme it seems will be opposed, particularly by the shipping interest of London.

TRADE OF SCOTLAND.

The manufactory of Linen Goods on the East coasts of Scotland, had been for some time past, and is, we are informed, at present unusually brisk. A vast quantity of goods from these parts have lately been exported from this city to the Brazils. The quantity, in most instances, is considerable more than double to what was previously sent to the Brazil markets. We observe, that the increased importation of undressed Flax into the port of Dundee for last year was 36,851 cwt. (33 per cent.) Montrose, 20,768 cwt. (30 per cent.) Aberdeen, 16,292 (33 per cent.) and Kirkcaldy 18,387 cwt. (34 per cent.)

The present is a most singular season. On Sunday, and during the greater part of Sunday night, we had excessive heavy squalls of wind, with showers of snow and hail accompanied with several loud peals of thunder and very vivid lightning.

MARCH 30.

In the House of Lords, on Tuesday, Lord King made a powerful speech in favour of Economy and Retrenchment. One of the topics which he pressed upon the attention of their Lordships was the lavish allowance made to British Agents at Foreign Courts. No less a sum than £133,000 is now spent upon 21 diplomatic persons; while in 1791, only £75,000 was given to 23. The cause of the augmented expense appears to be the same with that which occasioned two Post-Masters General. The appointments have been made lucrative, in order, no doubt, that they may be worthy of acceptance by men of influence in Parliament.

DUBLIN, MARCH 23.

From the County Cork we learn to day, that the Insurrection Act is producing the best results, and has already restored tranquillity to the neighborhood of Kanturk and Newmarket. The military, a few nights ago, scoured the mountainous parts of the Country, and succeeded in making 50 or 60 prisoners, many of whom, after an examination before the magistrates, were discharged, 14 were detained, 10 of whom were sent to Cork for trial.

LONDON, MARCH 24.

"FRANKFORT, MARCH 10,

"According to a letter which the King of England has just addressed to his sister the Landgravine of Hesse-Hombourg, it appears that this Monarch intends to proceed to the Continent, in the month of June next. Preparations are already making for his reception at the Court of Hombourg. His Majesty proposes visiting the Courts of Vienna and Berlin, from whence he will repair to his Hanoverian dominions and take the waters of Pyrmont, which the Physicians have recommended."

The books at the bank of England for the persons dissenting from the plans of Government closed on Saturday night, at 12 o'clock. The number dissenting are 1,373; the amount £2,605,978 6s. 10.

We learn from an authority in which we place confidence, that the Return of the Revenue, up to Saturday night, exhibits an increase of £450,000 over the corresponding period of last year.

MARCH 28.

Yesterday a Court of Directors was held at the East India House, when the Right Hon. GEORGE CANNING was appointed Governor-General of Bengal.

HOUSE OF LORDS, MARCH 19.

On the motion of the Chancellor of the Exchequer, £2,700,000 were granted to pay off the dissenters from the navy five per cent. reduction bill.

MARCH 26.

Earl Grey presented a Petition from the Assembly of the Province of Lower Canada, complaining that the produce of the Province sold last year had diminished one half, compared with the sales of the preceding years, and that the prices were diminished in the same proportion; that average exports had fallen from £766,770 to £511,392, and the imports from £1,247,700 to £863,000; that the revenue, which depended almost solely on the imports, had fallen from £1,024,442 to £781,544. The Petitioners further complained, that by the operation of the Corn Laws, they were prevented from sending their corn to this country for consumption, and that by the Navigation Laws, foreign vessels were excluded from their ports. Under the operation of the laws which affected the sale and consumption of their produce, they felt great difficulty in raising a revenue sufficient for making highways, supporting the establishments of the Province, &c. They concluded by praying, that all sorts of corn and grain the produce of Lower Canada, might be admitted, duty free, into the ports of the United Kingdom. The Noble Earl thought it necessary to state thus much in presenting the Petition, in order to call their Lordships' attention to the great distress in which the province of Canada was involved. The Petition was then read, and laid on the table.

Important Treaty between this Country and Denmark.

"It is confidently stated in the higher political circles, that a treaty has been, or is about to be concluded between this country and Denmark, by which the important fortress of the Sound is to be garrisoned by British troops, as soon as the first gun shall be fired by Russia against Turkey! If this account be correct, and of which we have no doubt, although we did not obtain it direct from an official source, it is of the highest importance, as Russia and her Allies, the Prussians will be thus prevented from sending even a boat through the Sound. This Treaty adds much credit to the diplomatic talents of our Noble Secretary for Foreign Affairs; and may account for our

His Majesty's brig Jassour, Capt Napier, from Halifax, arrived here on Sunday evening.

The ship Favourite, Davis, of and from Glasgow for this port, is ashore on the Ragged Islands.

The ship Argo, Loriman, from this port for Liverpool, has been fallen in with water logged. The crew (except two who had perished) were taken from the wreck.

The ship Margaret, Capt Crowder, from Liverpool to Passamaquoddy, 26 days out, was wrecked the 28th ult. on Tit-Manan—ship and cargo (of salt) belonging to J. Patterson, Esquire, of Campo Bello, entirely lost.

The British ship Spectator, Spink, from New-York, bound to St. John, N. B. sprung a leak, after passing Montaug, and filled rapidly. The crew and passengers abandoned her on Sunday about 15 miles S. of Newport Light, and took to the boats, and arrived at Newport. The ship was on her beam ends and full of water when they left her. On Monday she drifted ashore on Seconet Point, and went entirely to pieces the same afternoon. The passengers and crew saved part of their baggage and clothing. The ship was in ballast.—N. Y. Paper.

BOUNDARY LINE.—The Commissioners under the 5th article of the Treaty of Ghent, have closed their business, and held their final meeting in this city on Saturday last. The Commissioners, disagreeing in opinion have made separate reports, duplicates of which have been delivered to the agents of the two governments; and we understand, that the reports and accompanying papers designed for our government will be forwarded to Washington in course of this week.—N.
