

in so admirable a manner, the Marquis of Londonderry: under any circumstances the country would have deplored his death as a national loss—but when it sees that this lamentable event was indisputably caused by an over zealous devotion to its services, it will be affected with still deeper emotions of gratitude and regret.

The surprise and shock was so great, the calamity is yet so recent, that we cannot sit down with any great degree of coolness and reflection to pay the tribute we wish to his Lordship's general character.—His history is to be read in that of Europe, and it must be from the pen of the imperial historian, rather than of the fleeting journalist, that substantial and permanent justice can be rendered to his eminent talents and services.

His Lordship was born on the 18th of June, 1769, was consequently in his 54th year; a period of human life which might have permitted him to serve his country for many years to come, and to look forward to a dignified and honorable retirement.—These hopes, however, the inscrutable will of Divine Providence has not allowed to be fulfilled. The Marquis of Londonderry succeeded to the title upon his father's death, which took place last year. He has left no family, and consequently will be succeeded in the title and estates by his brother Lord Stewart, our Ambassador at the Court of Vienna.

The confusion, and agitation, which this unexpected and most calamitous event has created at the different Government Offices can hardly be described. Every one is running about inquiring if the news is true; and scarcely any one is able to give a collected answer upon the subject.

GREENOCK, AUGUST 16.

We have been politely favoured with the following brief, but interesting letter received here this morning. We regret to observe that it speaks of the King as looking rather unwell—but this may naturally be imputed to the joint operation of the fatigues of the voyage, and the shock which his feelings must have received on hearing of the melancholy death of the Marquis of Londonderry.—From the latter circumstances also, we are sorry to say, it is anticipated that his Majesty's stay will be limited to Wednesday next; but this we strongly hope and trust will prove incorrect:—

“Edinburgh, Thursday 3 P. M.
“I am once more seated, after standing and walking since 11, when we took our station near the barrier gate of Picardy Place. At 12 the roaring of cannon announced that his Majesty had left his yacht, and just at 1, I had the consummate delight of beholding my Sovereign. We were within a very few yards of him; I saw the ceremony of the keys of the city being presented. I had no idea of his Majesty being so low in stature. He did not seem well, which is conjectured to arise from the dismal news of Lord Londonderry. When he stood up to raise the Provost, never I believe did a Sovereign receive such heartfelt welcome as he did. I afterwards saw him alight at the Palace. The procession was admirably conducted. Report says his motions are thus—to-morrow and Saturday, Drawing Rooms and Levees—and on Monday his procession from the Palace to the Castle. This day is fraught with melancholy tidings—Lord Londonderry, Sir S. Auchmuty, and Lord Kinross. I am assured, that the King himself observed derangement some days ago in his Secretary of State, and communicated the circumstances to Lord Liverpool.—His Majesty, in consequence of this death, sets off on Wednesday.

Private letters and the Paris Papers talk of an approaching visit to Paris from the King of Prussia, while the Emperor of Russia resides at Vienna, on a visit to the Emperor of Austria. Political objects are assigned as the motives of both. We very much doubt whether the King of Prussia will proceed to Paris, but we apprehend that there is no doubt that the Emperor of Russia and the King of Prussia will not leave their own territories upon a tour of mere courtesy or amusement. It is already known, however, that the Emperor of Russia and the King of Prussia are going to Vienna, where subjects of great moment will be treated of and arranged, though possibly without the formality of a Congress.

FREDERICTON, (N. B.)

1st OCTOBER, 1822.

The English Mail for the month of August, arrived at the Post-Office this morning, but the dates by it are not so recent as have been received by an arrival at St. John, in 38 days from Greenock.

Parliament was prorogued by His Majesty in person, on the 6th of August. His speech will be found in this paper.

His Majesty arrived in Edinburgh, on the 15th. The Marquis of LONDONDERRY, (Lord Castlereagh) has put a period to his existence. For particulars relating thereto, and for many other important articles, we refer our readers to the preceding columns.

The Canada Trade Bill has passed, with the exception of that part which went to unite the two Provinces.
