

from Zanzibar to Bourbon, with 343 slaves, men, women, and boys. The Menai had previously captured the Emily schooner, with 80 slaves. The following is an extract from a letter describing the recent services of this ship:—"On the 23d April we embarked Prince Simiski, a Madagascar Chief, Mr. Hastie, Ambassador, Mr. David Griffith, Missionary (Dr. Bogue's pupil of Gosport,) with their suite, servants, baggage, &c. and arrived on the 29th at Tamative. We saluted and the forts returned it. About six hundred black fellows were down in a crack to clear the boats. The population is entirely black. The palace of the King, Randama, is situated on a prodigious high mountain, more than 300 mjes inland. One of his principal Generals was an Irish Sergeant in our Artillery. The King sent a messenger to our Ambassador (whose principal object is the abolition of the Slave traffic); that 1200 of his troops and 2000 slaves, were on the way to escort him up the country. There being no carriage conveyances, every thing is conveyed on men's backs. We had a bullock sent on board every day: they sell here at about a dollar and a half each, weighing from 300 to 400 lbs.—plenty of poultry, but no vegetables—lime and lemon trees grow wild.—In fact these civil islanders gave us every thing we wanted. We are now fitting, (12th of June) at Port Louis, for a two months cruise, intending to take a trip to the Johanna Islands, with two Madagascar Princes. This friendly island contains upwards of four million of inhabitants."

THE CHURCHMAN'S PROFESSION OF HIS FAITH AND PRACTICE.

I DO freely own and gratefully acknowledge, that I am a **CHRISTIAN**, Believing in **JESUS CHRIST** as the Saviour of the world, and that the Holy Scriptures are the Word of God, the ground of our faith, and the guide of our practice. But I am not only a Christian at large, and called so on account of my relation to Christ: I also feel myself happy in considering the nature of that relation, and the means by which it is formed, having been early taught to acknowledge that, in baptism, I was made a "Member of Christ," admitted into the Church, which is his Body, and entitled to all the benefits and advantages which he has purchased for it, and to a share in all the prayers which are offered in it.

This Church, or Society of Christians, united, as the Body of Christ, in an outward and visible form, as well as by an inward and spiritual grace, I consider as made up of several parts; some of which are, no doubt, more pure and regular than others, yet all who hold the essentials of religion—the Doctrine, Worship, and Ministry, which Christ established in his Church, I consider as belonging to it: and, though it be spread over the whole world, and all nations are invited to come into it, yet I look upon it as but one Body, Christ himself always speaking of it as such, and his Apostle St. Paul assuring us, that there is but one Body, as well as one Faith professed by it, one Baptism admitting into it, one Lord presiding over it. The Unity of the Church, therefore, I regard as an essential part of its character, and am well convinced that all the members of it, however dispersed through the several countries of the world, ought to believe the same articles of faith, to maintain the same orders of the ministry, to partake of the same sacraments, and to attend to the same authority in the administration of these sacraments; that so they may show themselves to be not only in communion with one another, but united also in professing the same principles which distinguished the first and purest ages of Christianity.

It is by adhering to these principles and preserving the original order and economy of the Christian Church, that we are enabled to enjoy the blessings and benefits of communion with it: and, therefore, next to what we owe to the Father of mercies for sending the Son to be the Saviour of the world, I reckon myself bound for ever to thank and praise our gracious God for this inestimable privilege, that I was born and baptized in a country where his holy religion is openly professed, and, by his good Providence, was admitted into communion with that portion of the Flock of Christ which bears the title of the **Protestant Episcopal Church**, and which, I do verily believe to be a sound and sincere part of that one Catholic and Apostolic Church, the belief of which makes an Article of our Creed.
