Melancholy Catastrophe.—On Wednesday last about 4 P. M. the Pilot Boat schr. Thorn, owned by the Messrs. REEDS, Pilots, of this City, was upset by a very heavy squall from the N. W. off Diplo Harbour, 4 miles from land, and almost immediately went down. The Thorn was purposely built for a Pilot Boat and was a superior vessel of her class, and at the time the unfortunate occurrence happened, was racing in company with the Pilot Boat schr. Thistle, which was about 4 miles to leeward. Every exertion was made by Mr. JOHN MILLS, Pilot, who was on board the Thistle, and by the boat of the schooner Cornwallis, Capt. McDONALD, who was in sight about 5 miles distance, to come to the assistance of the people, but their efforts were vain, as not a vestige of the vessel or crew were to be found. The persons on board at the time were Mr. CHARLES PURVIS, one of the Branch Pilots of this City, who has left a wife to lament his untimely exit; Mr. DAVID ALLSTON, of this City. Mr. ELIJAH ROGERS, aged 18, of Liverpool, England, and GEORGE GRAVER JAFFREY CHAPMAN, aged 12 years, son of Mr. CHAPMAN, of this City.
