

NEW-YORK, Nov. 15.

The brig Liverpool, at Norfolk, from Kingston, Jamaica, furnishes information to the 17th ult. A Tonnage Duty Bill had passed the House of Assembly, but the rate was not mentioned, it was formerly one dollar per ton. A Committee had been appointed to take into consideration the ruinous state of the Colony, and a motion made to reduce all public salaries 20 per cent.

A letter from Jamaica, states, that American vessels which had touched at any port in St. Domingo, would not be permitted to enter any of the British Islands.

BOSTON, Nov. 13.

A Spanish slave ship belonging to Havana, a prize to the British frigate Iphigenia, has been cast away in a violent tornado, on the coast of Africa, and 16 of her prize crew, together with 400 slaves, perished. Seven of the seamen saved themselves in one of her boats, and were picked up at sea, four days after the disaster.

H. B. M. frigate Hyperion, Captain Lillycrop, with an English schooner, arrived at Havana, on the 20th ult. and sailed again on the 27th, for Cape Antonio, in search of Pirates. The Hyperion is intended for the Havana station, and would shortly be joined by six new schooners from England, built for the purpose of cruising for Pirates along the coast.

The frigate Congress, Captain Biddle, sailed from Hampton Roads, 7th inst. on a cruise for the protection of our commerce against Pirates in the West India seas.
