At 12 o'clock the whole party sat down to an elegant supper prepared in Mr. Cody's best style, and enriched by the finest delicacies of the season. During supper the Band played some new pieces of music composed in honour of "the welcome stranger," by Mr. Browne of this City, which were much admired. Their Excellencies seemed highly delighted with the festivities of the evening, and retired at a late hour, leaving the gay throng to usher in the "rosy fingered Aurora, daughter of the dawn," on the light fantastic toe.

Next morning being foggy, His Excellency Sir JAMES KEMPT was prevented from setting sail for Nova Scotia as he had fully intended, and our spirited Amateurs got up the celebrated Play of *The Hair at Law*, which they acted in the evening in good style, and much to the satisfaction of the distinguished visitor.

We understand that His Excellency expressed himself highly pleased with the scenery of our new Theatre, and certainly the views of Athens and the Regent's Bridge, Edinburgh, do great credit to Mr. Foulis, the artist.

On Sunday the weather continued very unfavourable, and His Excellency was detained till the evening. He attended Divine Service at the English and Scotch Churches, and embarked on board the *Chebucto*, at 8 P.M. for Halifax, via Windsor.
