A Proclamation.

WHEREAS the General Assembly of this Province stands prorogued to Wednesday the fourth day of December next ensuing: I have thought fit further to prorogue the said General Assembly, and the same is hereby prorogued to the first Wednesday in February next ensuing; then to meet at Fredericton for the Dispatch of Business.

Given under my Hand and Seal at Fredericton, the twenty-fifth day of November, the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and twenty-two, and in the third year of His Majesty's Reign

PRIVATEERING ON A GRAND SCALE. An Expedition, consisting of a

brig of 16 guns and two transports, crowded with officers and men, under command of H. W. Decondry Holstein, lately commandant at Boca Chica, sailed Sept. 13, from St. Bartholemews; but having separated on the night of the 14th, in a gale, the brig sprung a leak, and being compelled to throw her guns overboard, put in that state into Curacoa; where she was taken possession of by a Spanish frigate lying there; and the General in Chief arrested by order of Marine Court. The original plan is said to have been to take possession of and Revolutionize the island of Port Rico; and a great number of Americans are said to have been engaged in the scheme.
