Postscript to the Gazette.

Commissioners of Roads.

Saint Andrews, July 23. - On Tuesday last, a gentleman named Briggs, was travelling on the Fredericton road, he was stopped about half a mile from Whitcher's by two foot pads, and robbed of 48 1-2 dollars; and yesterday morning between the hours of one and four o'clock, the Store of Mr. William Patterson, Watch-Maker and Jeweller, of this Town, was entered by some villain, or villains, and stripped of every article of value. A few days since, a person attempted to enter the House of Mr. James Parkinson, but was fortunately discovered in time to defeat his object.

The articles stolen from Mr. PATTERSON, we understand, amounted to about 200 dollars; and it gives us great pleasure to state that two Villains have been arrested, and most of the goods found upon them. The thieves were found by Mr. P. after a diligent search of several days, on board a vessel lying at the Narrows, and bound to the westward, but detained by the fog which enveloped us for some time. Much credit is due to the citizens of Lubec for the aid rendered Mr. Patterson in hunting these abandoned scoundrels who have lately migrated to this country from Europe. They were yesterday carried to St. Andrews, where it is presumed, they will be dealt with to the full extent of the Law in such cases provided. It is believed they are old offenders as implements for shop-breaking were found in their possession, and appeared to have been long used. - Ed. Sentinel.]
