The weather since Sunday has undergone a great change. On that day the thermometer ranged from 80 to 86; and on Tuesday evening the frost was so severe in this vicinity, as nearly to produce ice.

Hail Storm.—The town of Hacksack, N. J. was visited by a dreadful hail storm, on Saturday last. The hail stones were as large as the black walnut. More than 10,000 panes of glass were broken by it. There were a hundred and forty-six panes broken in the church.

LONDON, AUGUST 13.
Coroner's Inquest.

Ann Robinson, Lady's Maid to the Marchioness of Londonderry, and Dr. Bankhead, were examined, and the verdict was given nearly as follows:—"The Jury find, that the Noble Marquis has laboured under a grievous Jellusion of mind, on Monday the 12th of August, and for some days preceding. On that day, with a small pen-knife held in his right hand, he had inflicted a wound on the carotid artery on the left side of the neck, and made a cut one inch in length and two inches in breadth, which was the immediate cause of his Lordship's death."

Whatever may have been the opinion of the world as to his political character, however applauded by his friends or defamed by enemies, in the sweet retreat of private life—in the bosom of his family,—in this retirement, the Marquis of Londonderry was the most amiable and beloved of men. Here he was the benefactor of the poor, consoler of the afflicted, and the distributor of charities unbounded. To his domestics he was the kindest master. "Alas, Sir," was the observation of each of them this evening, "we have lost the best friend we ever had—we were too happy in his service."

It has been arranged that his Lordship's remains are to be deposited in Westminster Abbey, and that the funeral will take place on Monday next. In furtherance of this arrangement, the body will be removed to the mansion in St. James's Square, where it will lie in state for a day or two. It is expected that the removal will take place to-night.

The shell in which the body of the late Marquis was deposited immediately after the Inquest, was last night placed in a leaden coffin and soldered up, preparatory to its being enclosed in the state coffin.

The afflicted Marchioness has not yet left her chamber, and yesterday morning Lord Ellenborough set out for London without seeing her. Mr. Frederick Stewart, (now Viscount Castlereagh) also left the house at the same time, and proceeded to London. This young gentleman has been much affected by the shocking manner of his Uncle's death, and seems absorbed in the deepest melancholy.

The Marquis was born on the 18th of June, 1769, and married on the 9th of January, 1794, Amelia Hobart, youngest daughter and coheir of John, second Earl of Buckinghamshire, the present Marchioness. His Lordship, dying without issue, his titles and estates descend to his brother Lord Stewart, the present Ambassador at the Court of Vienna. Those who delight in observing such trivial circumstances will remark that yesterday was his Majesty's birth day, and that on that day last year, the deceased Minister landed with the King at the harbour of Howth in Ireland, amidst the loud acclamations of ardent loyalty.

This Noble branch of the House of Stewart, descended from Sir Thomas Stewart of Minto, second son of Sir William Stewart, of Galloway, ancestor of the Earls of Galloway. The father of the late Marquis was created to the dignity of Baron Londonderry, Nov. 18; 1789; Viscount Castlereagh, Oct. 6, 1795; Earl of Londonderry, Aug. 10, 1796, and Marquis of Londonderry a few years since.

His Lordship was educated at Armagh, under the tuition of Archdeacon Hurroch, and in 1786, was entered in Saint John's College, Cambridge.

A special meeting of the Committee of the Bible Association of Frederickton and its vicinity, was held on Saturday evening last, when a Box of Bibles and Testaments, which had been received from the Parent Society, in London, was opened, and several packages made up for the Country—some of which were immediately forwarded.—The remainder are deposited in Frederickton, to be disposed of under the direction of the Committee, agreeable to the regulations of the Association.

It must be gratifying to the friends of Bible Societies, to contemplate the existence of such an Institution in this Town; and when we reflect on the number of new Settlements that are forming in this part of the Province, and the number of poor Settlers who have not the means of procuring the Scriptures, the utility of encouraging such Societies, must be evident.

It is but justice to notice, the gratitude with which the Books distributed this Season by the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge, have been received in the upper part of the Country, where they are much wanted. But as there are many among us who cannot avail themselves of that excellent Institution, the Bible Association opens the door to all who have an inclination to contribute to the diffusion of the Scriptures. In this Institution, the small sum of one penny per week, constitutes a Member; and from Persons wishing to aid the Funds of the Association, without confining themselves to a stated sum, the smallest donation will be received.

It is pleasing to state, that by the reports and tracts relative to Bible Societies, which have been received, and circulated through the Country, much interest has been excited. A Bible Association has been lately organized at the Grand Lake; and a considerable remittance has just been received from the Nashwalk, in aid of the Funds of the Bible Association of Frederickton and its vicinity.

As the Funds of the Association amount at present to a considerable sum, a remittance will be made the first opportunity to the Parent Society, when another supply of Bibles and Testaments will be ordered for the use of this Country.
