Thoughts concerning Education.

(Continued.)

The morning is generally design'd for study, to which a full stomach is but an ill preparation. Dry bread, though the best nourishment, has the least temptation; and no body would have a child cramm'd at breakfast, who has any regard to his mind or body, and would not have him dull and unhealthy. Nor let any one think this unsuitable to one of estate and condition. A gentleman in any age ought to be so bred, as to be fitted to bear arms, and be a soldier.

I once liv'd in a house, where, to appease a froward child, they gave him drink as often as he cry'd; so that he was constantly bibbing. And tho' he could not speak, yet he drank more in twenty four hours, than I did. Try it when you please, you may with small, as well as with strong beer, drink your self into a drought. The great thing to be minded in education is, what habits you settle: and therefore in this, as all other things, do not begin to make any thing customary, the practice whereof you would not have continue, and increase. It is convenient for health and sobriety, to drink no more than natural thirst requires; and he that eats not salt meats, nor drinks strong drink, will seldom thirst between meals, unless he has been accusom'd to such unseasonable drinking.

Above all, take great care that he seldom, if ever, taste any wine or strong drink. There is nothing so ordinarily given children in England, and nothing so destructive to them. They ought never to drink any strong liquor, but when they need it as a cordial, and the doctor prescribes it.

Fruit makes one of the most difficult chapters in the government of health. Our first parents ventur'd paradise for it; and 'tis no wonder our children cannot stand the temptation. The regulation of this cannot come under any one general rule; for I am by no means of their mind, who would keep children wholly from fruit: by which strict way, they make them but the more ravenous after it, and to eat good or bad, ripe or unripe, melons, peaches, most sorts of plums, and all sorts of grapes in England, children should be kept from strawberries, cherries, gooseberries, or currans, when thorough ripe may be safely allow'd them, and that with a liberal hand: 1. not after meals, as we usually do, when the stomach is already full of other food: they should be eaten rather before or between meals and children should have them for their breakfast, 2. Bread eaten with them. 3. I imagine them conducing to our health. Summer-fruits, being suited to the hot season of the year they come in, refresh our stomachs, and therefore I should not be so strict in this point.

Apples and pears which are ripe, and have been gather'd some time, may be safely eaten especially apples, which never did hurt, after October.

Fruit also dry'd without sugar, I think very wholesome. But sweet-meats of all kinds are to be avoided; which, whether they do more harm to the maker or eater, is not easy to tell. This I am sure, it is one of the most inconvenient ways of expence that vanity hath yet found out; and so I leave them to the ladies.
