

She had since captured two American brigs and a French ship, and taken them into Orange Harbour, north side of Cuba. The pirate mounted one long brass 18 pounder on a pivot, five 12 pounders, and two long 9 pounders, taken from the L. D. The brig Gossypium, of Gloucester, was boarded within ten miles of the Havana, by a piratical schr. with from 30 to 40 men. The crew were ordered on board the schr. where the Captain was beaten, hanged, and thrown overboard; all the crew were more or less beaten, one was wounded in two places and hanged until apparently dead; another badly wounded with a dagger. They robbed the brig of stores, boats, &c. and about eighty dol. in money, and then let them go.
