ST. JOHN, JULY 10.

We regret to learn that there are some cases of Small Pox on-board the Ship Marcus Hill, of Londonderry, Ireland, which arrived in this port on Saturday last, with passengers. She has in consequence been ordered off to the Quarantine Ground, and an investigation is going on with the view of ascertaining whether or not the Master has been guilty of concealing the diseased persons from the view of the Health Officer. Should it appear that such has been the fact, we trust that no leniency will be shown to the individual who would thus expose to danger a whole community of his fellow beings. Meantime great alarm has spread throughout the City, and those who are most prejudiced against Vaccine Inoculation, are eagerly availing themselves of its benefit.—Star.

DIED] On Sunday afternoon, at 5 o'clock, in his 70th year, Mr. Charles M'Pherson, a native of Perthshire, Scotland. He left that country upwards of 20 years ago. He sailed from England on board a man-of-war, for the then British Provinces of America, and settled at Kingsbridge, near New York, in the year 1776. He was among the Loyalists who came to this country in 1783, and was consequently one of its earliest settlers. He has left a wife, a large family, and an extensive circle of relatives and friends, to lament his loss.
