

PARIS, Sept. 9.—The secretary of Sir William A'Court, has landed from Gibraltar, and presented himself at the head-quarters of the Duke d'Angoulême: he came to offer a capitulation under the mediation of England. The Prince, it is added, answered as a worthy descendant of Henry IV, that the delay which he allowed for negotiations having expired, he should trust for the issue to the French arms and the justice of the cause which the King had sent him to defend.

"The bombardment of Pampeluna began on the 2d Sept.

FIFTH CORPS.—ORCOYAN, SEPT. 4.—Yesterday, the 3d inst. Marshal Lauriston attacked the suburbs of Pampeluna. Our troops rushed forward with their usual ardour, and in spite of the fire from the batteries, and the fusillade from the houses and convents, which were covered with soldiers, the suburbs of La Madeleine, and of Rochepappell were carried. Our troops are now established there. Our loss was very considerable.

Corunna, Aug. 23.—Morillo and Gen. Bouché, entered here on the 21st. The whole garrison is united with the army of Morillo, after having taken the oath to the Regency. Campillo and Jauregui (the Pastor) would not submit, and are to be sent to France as prisoners of war.

BILBOA, Aug. 31. A great part of the garrison of Santona has left it to join the besiegers. It is thus certain that the place cannot hold out.

MADRID, Sept. 3.—Madrid is very quiet. All eyes are turned towards Cadiz. The Regency has instituted a Military Council for the organization of the Army. The Captain General Castanos is appointed President.

PARIS, Sept. 9.—If we may believe certain persons, understood to be well informed, the meeting of the Chambers will not be so long delayed as was at first supposed. The Ministers it is said, have to ask for more money, for the possibility of a second campaign next year begins to be recognized.

To day, before mass, His Excellency Sir C. Stuart, Ambassador Extraordinary for Great-Britain, presented to the King, at a private audience, the letter of His Sovereign, in answer to that which His Majesty had written to him, to put an end to the mission entrusted to the Viscount de Chateaubriand to the Court of London, in quality of Ambassador.

LONDON, Sept. 12.

The Paris Papers of Tuesday and Wednesday have reached town, (the latter by Express this morning).

Extract from a private letter from Paris, dated Wednesday last:—"It is rumoured, that Sir Charles Stuart has received instructions from his Government to propose terms of negotiation between France and Spain. What is certain is, that yesterday morning, Sir Charles and the Spanish Ambassador had a private audience of his Majesty, which lasted some time. It is understood that the English Ambassador used very strong language to the King, with which the latter was rather well pleased than offended, as he really desires the termination of the War, and is highly offended with the conduct of certain persons in his Council, who have done every thing in their power to paralyze the pacific efforts of the Duke d'Angoulême."—Globe.

The following was received from Bayonne to day.

BAYONNE, Sept. 4.—Letters from Cadiz have brought news of the taking of the Trocadero by assault. Detachments of sick from the army continue to arrive; the Military hospital here now contains 600, though some have been sent to the hospitals in the neighbouring towns.

A letter from Madrid states, that the Regency has given orders narrowly to watch all foreigners residing in that capital, especially the English.

The sick and wounded of the French Army in Spain, are stated to be 9,140.

An attempt is at present in progress in Paris to raise a loan for the Regency of Madrid.

Extract of a letter from Corfu, dated Aug. 8:—"I hasten to inform you of Lord Byron's arrival at Cefalonia, with the promised supplies of money and military stores for the Greeks."

A Frankfort Journal states, that a Copenhagen special committee has been appointed to draw up a Constitution for both the German and Danish provinces that compose the kingdom of Denmark.

The Russian Government has abandoned the ridiculous pretensions it put forth respecting the boundaries upon the shores of the Pacific, and by which it was proposed to turn that ocean into a lake subject to the power of the Russian autocrat.

The Russian Consul in London has issued an official notice, stating, that by an ordinance of the Emperor of Russia, all Consuls and Vice-Consuls residing in Foreign Countries, are required to relinquish Freemasonry Societies, if they belong to any such, or to relinquish the service of his Imperial Majesty.

A correspondence has taken place between a number of British merchants trading to the new States of South America, and the Foreign Secretary here. The Merchants demand the appointment of Commercial Agents for Great-Britain, in ports of the new Republics. Mr. Planta, by order of Mr. Canning, returned the following answer:—

Foreign Office, Aug. 22, 1823.
Gentlemen,—I am directed by Mr. Secretary Canning, to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 21st ult. recommending the establishment of Consulships in the ports of South America. I am to acquaint you, that the subject is under consideration.

The New-York Grand Canal, which has taken but little more than six years to complete, is navigable 360 miles, and cost about six millions of dollars.

The London Times, in giving a very flattering notice of this "monument of public spirit and national prosperity," asks:—

"When shall we see the inhabitants of a small province of any of the torpid and priest-ridden monarchies of continental Europe, execute such a work by their own spontaneous act, and with their unassisted resources? The canal, which extends from Black Rock at the east end of Lake Erie, to Albany, will render the Hudson river, the chief—almost the sole outlet, and New-York the great emporium of a fertile country extending along the lakes, much larger than the British Isles, and fast filling up with inhabitants. Proceeding eastward from Lake Erie, the canal rises 48 feet, and from the summit's level falls 601 feet, to the Hudson, make an aggregate rise and fall of 649 feet, which is effected by 77 locks. Two levels or reaches extend over 65 and 70 miles without a lockage, a circumstance perhaps without parallel, except in China. The stimulus it gives to improvement is already seen in the villages and towns which are springing up with astonishing rapidity along the whole course.

It is not difficult to see that this Canal, with the one connecting Lake Champlain and the Hudson, will even have a certain political effect on the British American possessions. These two canals afford a much readier channel than the St. Lawrence for the exportation of wood, flour, and other articles, from the Canadian as well as the American side of the Lakes, and with this farther advantage, that they are shut by ice only three months and a half, whereas the St. Lawrence is shut nearly six months in the year. They will therefore connect the Canadians more closely with the Americans by the ties of mutual intercourse and interest, and even render the former in some measure dependent on the latter for their produce."—Hav. Gaz.

The Citizens of Washington have invited the Inhabitants of Maryland, Virginia, Pennsylvania, and Ohio, to send Dele-

gates to that place, for the purpose of making arrangements for opening a Canal to connect the waters of the Potomac and Ohio.

The survey of the Cumberland and Oxford Canal has been completed, and the expense estimated at something short of one hundred and thirty-eight thousand dollars.—Argo.

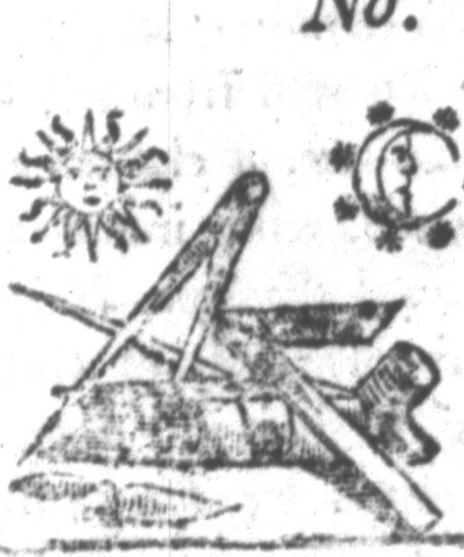
