PARIS, Sept. 9 .- The secretary of Sir William A'Court, has landed from Gibralter, and presented nimselfar the head-quarters of the Duke d'Angouleme : he came to offer a capitulation under the mediation of England. The canal, which extends from Black Rock at the east end of Lake Erie, to Albany, will render the Hudson river the chief - almost the sole outlet, and New-York the great emporium of a fertile country extending along the lakes, much larger than the British Isles, and fast filling up with inhabitants. Proceeding eastward from Lake Erie, the canal rises 48 feet, and from the summit's level falls 601 feet, to the Hudson, make an aggregate rise and fall of 649 feet, which is effected by 77 locks. Two levels or reaches extend over 65 and 70 miles without a lockage, a circumstance perhaps without parallel, except in China. The sumulus it gives to unprovement is already seen in the villages and towns which are springing up with astonishing rapidity along the whole course. It is not difficult to see that this Canal, with the one connecting Lake Champlain and the Hudson, will even have a certain poluical effect on the British American possessions. These two canals afford a much readier channel than the St. Lawrence for the exportation of wood, flour, and other articles, from the Canadian as well as the American side of the Lakes, and with this farther advantage, that they are shut by ice
