

been prepared, and the service was concluded by the Ecclesiastical Commissary.

A signal was then given, when one round from 7 field pieces was fired slowly, followed by a volley of musquetry from the whole of the Infantry; and a second and third round in like manner.

The Troops then moved off in profound silence, and the Vault was immediately closed.

Thus were interred the Remains of His Excellency Major General GEORGE STACEY SMYTH, Lieutenant Governor and Commander in Chief of the Province of New-Brunswick.

Major-General SMYTH arrived in this Province in the year 1812, with a special appointment as administrator of the Government (in the absence of Lieutenant-Governor CARLETON); and continued in the administration thereof from that period until his death, with the exception of the times that he was absent, once to England, for the benefit of his health, and at another time to Nova-Scotia, in the command of the General Military District and the administration of the Government of that Province, upon the promotion of Sir JOHN SHERBROOKE.

In 1817, he succeeded to the place of Lieutenant-Governor, upon the death of General CARLETON.

A residence of upwards of nine years will be sufficient to enable those under his Government to form a tolerably correct estimate of His character both public and private.

The main scope of his administration will be found to have been, to promote, by every means within his power, the peace, prosperity, and happiness, of the Province. He was a most faithful Servant of His Royal Master, and zealously attached to the British Constitution, in Church and State. It was his ardent wish to see our Colonial System brought to such a state of perfection, as to resemble as nearly as possible, in every respect, the pre-eminently excellent original.

His successful exertions for the further endowment of Churches and for the establishment of Schools for the instruction of all, but particularly the poorer Classes, will long be gratefully remembered.

His private character was fairly and very impressively and justly drawn by the Revd. Mr. SOMERVILLE, in the Pulpit, on Sunday last, in a Sermon from the Text-- "Mark the perfect man, and behold the upright, for the end of that man is peace."

His Honor the President has been pleased to issue a Proclamation calling a meeting of the Legislatures of this Province on Wednesday the 25th day of June next.-- See Gazette.

BRITISH SUMMARY.

In addition to the ministerial change mentioned in our last, Mr. Huskisson will succeed Mr. F. Robinson as president of the Board of Trade and is himself succeeded by Mr. Arbuthnot in the office of Woods and Forests. Mr. Lushington takes Mr. Arbuthnot's place at the Treasury, and Mr. Herries is to have the Secretaryship that Mr. Lushington held.

The Marquis of Londonderry returns from Vienna, at his own request and is succeeded by Sir Henry Wellesley.

We perceive in two London papers, the Star and the Chronicle, that Lord Colchester, late Speaker of the House of Commons, succeeds Lord Bathurst as Secretary for the Colonies. Lord Bathurst takes Lord Harcourt's place as Lord President of the Council, and Lord H. retires. Not being satisfied, however of the fact, on the authority of the above mentioned papers, we give it as we find it.

Mr. Baron Wood retires from the Bench, and rumour says will be succeeded by Mr. Gaselee, King's Counsel.

The election for Liverpool is fixed for the 12th February.

Parliament meets on the 4th of February, and the next arrival will probably bring the King's speech.

His Majesty has had a severe attack of the gout. He is happily recovering.

Lord Viscount Granville, brother to the Marquess of Stafford, has had a narrow escape.

He was accidentally shot by the Duke of Wellington, but is now recovered.

Doctor HUTTON, the great mathematician, died at his house in Bedford Row on the 27th Jan. in the 87th year of his age. The world has also to lament the death of the illustrious JENNER, the discoverer of vaccination, at his house, at Berkley, on 26th of Jan. in the 74th year of his age.
