

Asiatic, dissatisfied at not being permitted to return to their own country, could only tend to increase the disorder if brought into the city; he also added that it was doubtful if they would be willing to turn their arms against the Janissaries, and on the contrary, their thirst for pillage was such that they would sooner have recourse to that business, than obey the orders of the Grand Vizier.

Yesterday the annual meeting of Miramichi Sabbath School Union, was held in the Grammar School, when it appeared by the report that last year there were 216 Children attending the different Schools, and that upwards of £12 had been contributed, for procuring books to be given as rewards of merit and diligence.

This Institution was formed last year for the purpose of instructing the rising generation in the principles of religion and morality. It consists of 14 Schools, which are taught gratuitously—managed by a Committee of 24 Gentlemen, including a Secretary and Treasurer, and is supported by voluntary contributions.

Similar Societies have been the means of doing immense good in different parts of the world, and if this one should be conducted for a few years with the same attention as last year, it cannot fail, with the Divine blessing, of being a great benefit to the youth of this place.

YORK COUNTY.

In General Session,
15th January 1823.

WHEREAS it appears that the number of Taverns heretofore licenced within the County of York, is far greater than is necessary for public convenience, and many persons have obtained Tavern licences for the sole purpose of selling spirituous liquors, without having the means of furnishing the requisite accommodation for Travellers, which is found a great public injury and destructive of the morals of the people. Resolved therefore that the following Regulations be adopted with regard to the granting of licences for Taverns in future, within the County:

1st. That in future no licence for keeping a Tavern within the Town of Fredericton, be granted to any person unless such person shall be able to prove to the satisfaction of the Court, that he can furnish at least

two good beds, four suitable stands for horses, two separate rooms, and such other accommodation for Travellers and others who may require it, as shall appear to the Court to be necessary.

2d. That no licence be granted for keeping a Tavern in any other part of the County, unless the applicant shall be able in like manner to prove to the satisfaction of the Court, his ability to furnish at least two beds, and six stands for horses, one private room, and such other accommodation for Travellers as the Court shall judge expedient.

3d. That no licence in future be granted for a less sum than two pounds.

4th. That in future every application for a Licence be in writing, containing the name of the applicant, his place of residence, and state particularly the number of beds that he can furnish, and the other accommodations to his house and stables; and that such application and statement be accompanied by a Certificate of a Magistrate resident in the Parish, which Certificate shall prove the truth of the statement made by the applicant, and shall also express the opinion of the Magistrate respecting the expediency of licensing such Tavern.

5th. Ordered that the preceding Regulations be forthwith published in the Royal Gazette, and also in hand bills, to be distributed throughout the County, in order that all persons concerned may be duly apprized thereof, and govern themselves accordingly.
