45 The Lieutenant-Governor informs the House of Assembly, that in pursuance of a representation made by the Collector of His Majes: y's Customs at Saint John, he had, with the advice of His Majesty's Council, appointed a number of persons to assist in collecting the duties lately given to the Province by an Act of the Imperial Parliament: He directs to be laid before the House, an account of expences incurred by this measure, amounting to £79 5, and recommends to the House to make provision for payment of the same, and also for defraying similar expences in future.
