

FREDERICTON, (N. B.)

TUESDAY, 5th AUGUST, 1823.

COMMUNICATED.

At a meeting of the Magistrates and principal Inhabitants of Miramichi, held at New-Castle, on the 23d July 1823, RICHARD SIMONDS, Esq. was called to the Chair, and the following Address unanimously agreed to:

"To Lieutenant Richard Davies, Commanding the Detachment of His Majesty's 74th Regiment, at Miramichi."

"Sir,
"Having just heard that the detachment of His Majesty's 74th Regiment, under your command, is to be immediately withdrawn from this station, we cannot allow you to leave us without expressing to you our approbation of your conduct since your residence among us.

"Ordered here by the Commander-in-Chief, at a time of unexampled difficulty; to aid the Civil Authorities in maintaining the peace of the County, the duties you had to perform were of an arduous and delicate nature. Your zealous and unremitting attention to a service of so great importance to this part of His Majesty's Colonies—the judicious manner in which that service has been performed—the steady discipline you have kept up in the Detachment of Troops under your command, and their consequent good behaviour, all contribute to cause a sincere regret on our part, that you are so soon to leave us.

"The sentiments of high respect and esteem which we entertain for your character as an Officer and a Gentleman, are, we are confident, in accordance with those of the People of the County at large.

"Accept of our sincere wishes for your happiness and prosperity.

The above Address was transmitted to Lieut. DAVIES, by Mr. SIMONDS, accompanied by the following Letter:

"Miramichi, July 23rd, 1823.

The following is Lieutenant DAVIES' reply:

"New-Castle, Miramichi, 23rd July, 1823.

"Sir,
"I have this moment had the honor of receiving your polite favour of this date, enclosing the highly complimentary Address of the Magistrates and principal Inhabitants of Miramichi. I certainly feel myself much flattered, and I confess extremely gratified, to find my conduct and that of the Detachment under my command, since I have been stationed here, have been such as to call forth an attention so totally unlooked for and unexpected on my part.

"Just on the eve of marching, want of time prevents me from expressing my sentiments upon the occasion so fully as I could wish, and as such kind attention merits.

"I must beg you will return my most sincere thanks to the Gentlemen who have favoured me with the Address, and assure them that I shall always have great pleasure on hearing of their welfare, and of the general prosperity of Miramichi.

"And now, Sir, permit me to offer you, individually, my acknowledgments for the polite and gentlemanly Letter accompanying the Address: And begging you will accept my best wishes, and excuse this hasty reply,

To Richard Simonds, Esq. Chairman at a Meeting of

the Magistrates and Inhabitants of Miramichi, held at New-Castle, 23rd July, 1823.

A few days since, as a young man of the name of Smith, was going from the South Branch of the Oromocto towards Shin Creek, carrying a pack with provision to a camp where a party which he belonged to were lumbering, in following a spotted line through the woods, in a very thick alder swamp, about noon discovered, at a distance of 4 rods before him, an animal of a dark colour, coming directly towards him. Not being armed, and taking it for a bear, he instantly made for a tree, and had got up about 12 feet when the creature approached it. Having a jack-knife, he immediately cut loose the provision, in hopes that its attention would be attracted therewith; but not appearing to notice it, it sprang from the ground, and at once gained the feet of its victim, tearing off both shoes with part of the right heel. Several times it ascended a tree about 6 feet from that in which Smith was, and from thence leaped on its object, tearing the flesh from his legs and right arm in a shocking manner, endeavouring each time to pull him down to the ground. The last attempt it made, Smith gave it two wounds with his knife in its neck, and which is probably the means that prevented the animal attempting further violence, as it then disappeared. The cries of the sufferer were heard by the party in the camp, (which was distant only half a mile from the spot where he was attacked) who instantly followed the sound, and carried their lacerated comrade there. He has since been removed to Town for Medical attendance, with but faint hopes of recovery.

We feel happy in being enabled to state, that the Small Pox, now prevalent in Saint John, has not yet made its appearance in this part of the country, but how soon we may be visited with that loathsome disease, we know not; we therefore solicit Parents to embrace the present opportunity of getting their children inoculated with the Kine Pock. A number of the Aborigines, encamped opposite our town, have submitted themselves (not without their natural fear) to be inoculated.
