A Proclamation.

WHEREAS several Persons have memorialled for Licences to cut Pine Timber off the Crown Lands, without coming forward to take out the same, and have their Births surveyed agreeably to regulation... Such Persons are hereby cautioned against proceeding to cut the Timber applied for, under the penalty of being proceeded against in common with other Trespassers.

A list will be published in the Royal Gazette, of the names of those Persons who have taken out their Licences and complied with all the requisite conditions; after which notification, no more Licences will be granted for the present Season.

To all whom it may concern Greeting:

NOTICE is hereby given that upon the application of James Wood, to me duly made according to the form of the Act of Assembly in such case made and provided, I have directed all the estate as well real as personal within this Province, of Thomas A. Hammond is departed from and out of the limits of this Province, with intent and design to defraud the said James Wood, and the other creditors of the said Thomas A. Hammond, (if any there be) of their just dues, or else to avoid being arrested by the ordinary process of the Law as it is alleged against him) to be seized and attached; and that unless the said Thomas A. Hammond do return and discharge the said debt or debts, within three months from the Publication hereof, all the estate as well real as personal of the said Thomas A. Hammond within this Province will be sold for the payment and satisfaction of the Creditors of the said Thomas A. Hammond.

HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY,

Extracts from the Journal.
Thursday, 6th February.

A bill, "to repeal an Act passed in the 3d year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled An Act further to continue the Acts for more effectually repairing the Streets and Bridges in the City and County of Saint John," was read a first time.

The Clerk of the Crown attended with the Writ and Return, pursuant to the order of yesterday, and it appearing thereby that *William Wilnot, Esq.* is duly elected a Member of this House for the County of Westmorland, in the room of *Joseph Cranford Esq.* whose seat was declared vacated. It is ordered, that Mr. Smith and Mr. Clarke, do attend the Commissioner with Mr. Wilnot, and see him qualified.

Mr. Stubs, presented a Petition of the Grand Jury for the County of Charlotte, praying that an Act might pass, directing that the Justices of the General Sessions for the said County of Charlotte, should cause to be laid before the Grand Inquest at the

April Session in each and every year, a statement of the County accounts, with the vouchers, to be examined by them,

Mr. Clarke, presented a Petition of sundry Inhabitants of the Parish of St Stephens, in the County of Charlotte, praying for a division of the same. Which were received and laid on the table.

Mr. Stubs, brought in a bill, "to repeal the Acts for regulating, laying out, and repairing Highways and Roads, and for appointing Commissioners and Surveyors of Highways within the several Towns and Parishes of this Province, and to make more effectual provision for the same," and a bill, "to incorporate sundry persons by the name of *The Trustees of the Poor of St. Andrews.*" Which were read a first time.

Mr. Smith, from the Committee appointed to attend the Commissioner with Mr. Wilnot, and see him qualified, reported that the Committee had attended to that duty, and that Mr. Wilnot had taken the oaths prescribed by Law--Upon which, Mr. Wilnot took his seat.

Friday, 7th February.

Mr. Ritchie, presented a Petition from Robert Ludgate, a Settler on the great road leading from Saint John to Saint Andrews, praying further aid to enable him to make an establishment for the accommodation of Travellers. Ordered to lie on the table.

Mr. J. Wilnot, presented a Petition of Richard Hichings, a Settler on Great Seal Island, praying pecuniary aid to assist him in forming a settlement thereon.--Referred to the Committee of Supply.

A bill, "to repeal an Act intituled "An Act to continue the Acts for more effectually repairing the Streets and Bridges in the City and County of Saint John," was read a second time and ordered to be committed to-morrow--the order was discharged on the 8th, and the bill ordered to be committed on Wednesday.

A bill, "to repeal the Acts for regulating, laying out, and repairing Highways and Roads, and for appointing Commissioners and Surveyors of Highways within the several Towns and Parishes of this Province, and to make more effectual provision for the same," was read a second time.

Mr. R. Simonds, presented a Petition of Edward H. Cutler, praying to be allowed the differences between the long and short duty on nineteen puncheons of rum imported by him.--Referred to the Committee of Supply.

Mr. Clarke, presented a Petition of sundry Mill Holders in the Parish of St. Stephens, in the County of Charlotte, praying for leave to be incorporated. Ordered to lie on the table.

Mr. Stubs, presented a Petition accompanied with other vouchers, of Edward Foster, praying that the sum of £137 10 being the duty on 25 puncheons of rum imported into this Province, may be refunded, the same having been exported to the United States in 1821.

And also a Petition, accompanied with other vouchers, of Alexander Thompson, of Campo Bello, praying for a drawback on nine puncheons of rum exported by him to the United States, amounting to £44 15 10.--which were referred to the Committee of Supply.

Mr. Stubs, presented a Petition of Cadwallader Curry, of Campo Bello, in the County of Charlotte, praying that the sum of £34 16 8, be granted him, for the drawback on ninety casks of Molasses exported by him to the United States.

Also a Petition of Cadwallader Curry, praying that the sum of £59 0 4, being the aggregate amount of the non-resident tax on sundry cargoes imported by him in 1819 may be allowed him.

And also a Petition of Cadwallader Cur-

ry, praying that the sum of £48 be granted to him, being the amount of duties on sundry cattle imported by him from the United States, and exported and landed in the Island of Trinidad, in the year 1819: Which were referred to the Committee of Supply.

Mr. Clarke, brought in a bill, "to establish certain Mill and Log Owners in the Parish of St. Stephens, as a Corporate Body." Which was read a first time.

Mr. R. Simonds, by leave presented a Petition of John M. Johnston, of Miramichi, praying to be reimbursed in the sum of £38, being the amount exacted under the non-resident Act.--Referred to the Committee of Supply.

On motion of Mr. Stubs, resolved that a Committee be appointed to examine all accounts for the support of transient Poor, and indigent Emigrants, that may be presented to this House for Legislative aid.

Ordered that Mr. Stubs, Mr. Miles, Mr. Wetmore, Mr. Allen, Mr. W. Peters, Mr. Smith, Mr. R. Simonds, and Mr. J. Wilnot, be a Committee for that purpose.

Mr. Clarke, presented a Petition of the Overseers of the Poor for the Parish of Saint Stephens, in the County of Charlotte, praying that remuneration might be made for monies expended for the support of transient Poor in that Parish.--Referred to the Committee appointed to examine the accounts for the support of transient Poor and indigent Emigrants.

Saturday, 8th February.

Mr. Slason, brought in a bill, "further to alter and amend the Laws now in force for assessing, collecting, and levying rates for Parish charges." Which was read a first time.

The House resolved itself into a Committee of the whole House, in consideration of His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor's Speech.

Mr. McKay, from the Committee, reported that they had gone into consideration of His Excellency's Speech to them referred, and that the Committee had made the following two resolutions:

1.--Resolved, that a Committee be appointed to inquire what sums have been heretofore granted for the improvement of the Navigation of the several Rivers in this Province, the amount of what has been expended of the said grants, and the best means now to be adopted for removing obstructions in the said Rivers, and improving the towing paths along the banks of the same.

2.--Resolved, that it is expedient in the opinion of this Committee, that the Acts for the encouragement of Schools in this Province, should be revised and amended, and that a Committee be appointed for that purpose.

And that he was directed to ask for leave to sit again.--the report was accepted and leave granted.

On motion, ordered that Mr. Fraser, Mr. McKay, Mr. Miles, Mr. J. Wilnot, Mr. W. Peters, Mr. Wetmore, Mr. M. Wilnot, and Mr. R. Simonds, be a Committee to carry into effect the first resolution:

And that Mr. Smith, Mr. R. Simonds, and Mr. Stubs, be a Committee to carry into effect the second resolution.

Monday, 10th February.

The House resolved itself into a Committee on the bill, "further to alter and amend the Laws now in force for assessing, collecting, and levying rates for Parish charges."

Mr. H. Peters took the Chair of the Committee.

Mr. Peters, from the Committee, reported that they had gone into consideration of the bill to them referred, and in the Committee the following resolution was moved and seconded:

"Resolved that the further consideration of the bill be postponed for three months."--That on the question being put thereon,

the Committee divided as follows: YEAS, 8.--NAYS, 11.

Mr. Simonds, brought in a bill, "to amend an Act, intituled "An Act to alter and amend the Laws now in force for assessing, collecting, and levying of rates for Public charges." Which was read a first time.

Mr. Smith, brought in a bill, "in amendment of the Laws now in force for the support and relief of confined Debtors, and for the further relief of Debtors with respect to the imprisonment of their persons."

Mr. Stubs, brought in a bill, "for regulating the impaction of Fish for home consumption." Also

A bill, "to continue an Act intituled "An Act for granting further aid in support of the Grammar School in the Town of Saint Andrews." Which were read a first time.

Mr. Johnston, from the Committee appointed at the last Session to examine the accounts of the Deputy Treasurer of West Isles, made the following report:

That they find the difference of £354 3 5, between his accounts of 1820 and 1821, to arise in the following manner:--

In his account current with the Province for 1820, he did not include a return of drawback, amounting to £367 3 5, in consequence of one of the vouchers wanting a signature; but he charges the Province with £13 for stationary, which was not allowed him. In his account current of 1821, having received the necessary vouchers for the drawbacks of £367 3 5, he charges the Province with the same, and credits the sum of £13 for stationary not allowed him--which makes the balance of £5847 13 1, brought forward by him in 1821, correct--viz.

Balance of account current of December, 1820, £6201 16 6
To which add stationary not allowed, 13 0 0

Deduct drawbacks, 367 3 5

Balance, £5847 13 1
Agreeably to the account current of the Deputy Treasurer of 1821.

Thursday, 11th February.

Mr. Stubs, obtained leave to bring in a bill, "to continue an Act intituled "An Act to authorize the Justices of the Peace in their General Sessions, to establish Ferries in their respective Counties."

Mr. M. Wilnot, brought in a bill, "to empower the General or Special Sessions of the Peace in the County of Westmorland, to establish such rules and regulations in establishing water fences in any situation in said County that may require the same," which was read a first time.

The House resolved itself into a Committee of the whole House, on a bill, to establish certain Mill and Log Owners in the Parish of St. Stephens, as a Corporate Body."

Mr. Allen, from the Committee, reported that they had gone into consideration of the bill to them referred.--That in the Committee the following resolution was made:

"Resolved that the further consideration of the bill be postponed until the next meeting of the Legislature."

Mr. Stubs, brought in a bill, "to repeal the Acts now in force for encouraging the raising of Bread-Corn." Also

A bill "to continue an Act intituled "An Act to authorize the Justices of the Peace in their General Sessions, to establish Ferries in their respective Counties."

Mr. Smith brought in a bill, "to repeal the Laws now in force for the encouragement of the Fisheries in this Province." Also
