TRIPOLIZZA, MAY 4.

The Greek national assembly, after completing its labour in peace and tranquillity, broke up on the 30th of April. All the provincial governments existing before this meeting, those of Peloponnesus, of Western Greece, and of Aroepagus, are abolished and all Greece is now under one central democratic government, consisting of two branches, the legislative authority, of which the President is George Konourios; of the celebrated Lazo Konourios, who is at the head of the affairs of Hydra; and the Executive, the President of which is Peroo Maurocordatus, formerly Prince of Maine, and known by the name of *Petra Bey*. The government has already issued many ordinances; it has also addressed a proclamation to the European nations, in which it returns thanks for the assistance which individual friends of humanity have hitherto afforded to the Greeks.
