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DEATH OF THE DUTCHESS OF NEW-CASTLE .- We are sorry to announce the death of her Grace the Dutchess of Newcasile. The melancholy event took place at Cumberland, the family seat, in Nottinghamshire, early on Friday morning. Her Grace was delivered of twins, a boy and a girl, the latter still born; on Tuesday last. She was considerably better on Thursday, and in a favourable way, but a sudden change for the worst took place. Her Grace was Georgiana, Elizabeth, danghter of Edward M. Munday, Esq. born 1st of June, 1789, and married July 18, 1807. There was issue of this marriage sixteen children, viz. eleven sons and five daughters, of whom there are now living nine sons and three daughters; of these four were boin at two birtis.

CRYING .- AL a lute assize in Sometseishire, the Court was extremely crowded with persons anxious to hear a case of great interest, which stood first on the list. No vouce, however, was heard; all was silent suspense. At length the Judge rose up, --. where is the Crier, what is he about that he desen's open the Contr ?" -- when a countryman, pressing forward among the crowd, exchaimed-." Lie's not here; his wife's dead, my Lord; he can't cry to-day."

BRITISH NAVY .-- By the quarterly official returns of the Admiralty, made up to the 25th September, the total number of ships is 600, including 84 ships. &c. now bu ding in different dock-yards. Amongst the latter are four 120 gun ships; two of 210 ctins; one of 86; four of 84; six of 80; one of 74--- the remainder from 60 d wa to 10 guns.

INDIAN ARMY .--- The army in the service of the East India Company, consists of, in all 180,000 regular native troops, officered by about 4000 Europeans; milita and irregulars about 30.000; and European forces 20,000; forming an army of 230,000.

LONGITUDE .-- A very ingenious instrument has been invented by Mr. Harley, of the chain pier, at Trinny, for ascertaining the longitude. It has been submitted, we understand, to six Naval Officers, who concur in opinion, that it will completely answer its intended purpose on land, or at sea, in scaim weather, but they are decided in opinion of the impracticability of using it at sea in stormy weather, owing to the violent motion to which it will be subjected; this objection, however, if it cannot be obviated, must apply to all other instruments of a similar description. Mr. Harley has taken his inscrument to London, to be there inspecied. The reward offered for the discovery of a complete instrument for ascertaining the longitude, is, we believe, £20,000 .--Lainburgh Ado.

The following is a copy of the inscription on the principal plate (of gold) deposited in the foundation stone of the National Monument of Scotland. The other two plates Dore the names of the Magistrates of the City, and the office-bearers of the Grand Lodge:

To the Glory of God, in Honour of the King, for the good of the People, this Monument, the Tribute of a Grateful Country, to Her Callant and Illustrious Sons, as a Nicmorial of the past, and Incentive to the future Heroism of the Men of Scotland .--Was founded on the 28th day of August, to the year of our Lord 1822, and in the 2 year of the glorious reign of George IV. under his immediate auspices, and in commemoration of his most gracious and welcome Visit to his ancient capital, and the Palace of his Royal Ancestors ... John, Duke of A hol, James, Doke of Montrose, Archibald John, Earl of Roseberry, John, Earl of Hopemun, Robert, Viscount Melville, and Thohas, Lord Lynedoch, officiating as Com-

missioners, in the name and behalf, and by special appointment of his august Majesty, the pation of the undertaking. The celebrated Parthenon of Athens beling the model of the edifice.

\* Thomas, Earl of Elgin and Kincardine, was added by his Majesty to the Commission after the plate was engraved.

The old ship found in Kent, and supposed to be 900 years old, was uncovered of earth and raised and floated with the intention of floating her to the Thames, for the inspection of the curious.

Particular orders have, it is said, been given to the two regiments of Life Guards and Oxford Blues, not to shave the upper lip; under the supposition, no doubt, that their military appearance will dicreby be

improved. A Carpet has been manufactured at the royal establishment of the Supomeris, at Paris, destined for the hall of the throne, which is believed to be the largest that has ever been executed. It is 50 feet long, and 30 wide, and might have been done in one piece agreeably to the design, but it would have required, in that case, nine years for its execution. For the sake of greater expedition, it was divided into three paris, which have been accomplished in thee years. Agreeably to the details that have been furnished, it has cost, in labour alone, 50,000 francs -- ten thousand dollars.

Timber Carriages, or Teams .--- The teams used for transporting bulky timber from place to place, in Liverpool, are allowed to be extremely appropriate. They consist of two pair of wheels; the front set, to which the horses are attached by shafts, are of the usual size of those of a carr : the hind wheels, to which is attached a guiding pole, are of double the diameter. These vehicles being separated according to the length of the timber to be carried, the load is suspended by axleurees - the front being raised by a standing windlass - the other end by the pole acting as a lever. Our country readers will be enabled to form some estimate of the prodigious load which one of these teams will support, when informed, that three days ago, the proprietor of one of them, for a wager, conveyed with facility a load of nearly 13 tons weight of timber from the far end of the Queen's Dock to the Canal, a distance, we should suppose, little short of two miles, and by a road by no means legel. Five horses were employed on the level, and seven when going up hill. The horses, we are told, was by no means distressed.

## SAINT JOHN, JANUARY 2.

By the schooner Nancy, which arrived this morning from New-York, we received papers from that City to the 25th ult. from which we hastily copy the following: -

New YORK, DEC. 24. Latest from Europa ... They are also indebted to Capr. Rogers for extensive files of London journals. Such of their contents as possess interest are given bel w.

We observe by our files of Ltoyd's Lists, to the 5 h ult. that during the latter part of Oct. and beginning of Nov. the weather had been very tempermous on the European coast, and that considerable damage had been sustained by foreign vessels .-- The prevalent gales were westerly.

Romours had reached London through the Paris prints of the asi, of some difficulries having occurred at Verona, of a nature likely to disturb the harmony of the expected conferences. The following extracts will sew to what d gree of credit they are entitled.

intelligence from Veroma of the 25th of October: nothing has yet transpired with respect to the deliberations of Congress,---

L'Etoile. " Strange reports are circulated with respect to Congress. The return of the Emperor of Russia to his own empire is spoken of three days before the intended period.

" A journal gives a letter from Vienna of the 31st, which says --- the Emperor of Austria, it is said, will return seoner to his capital than was intended, and the affairs which are to become the objects of deliberation at Congress, will be terminated at Vienna by the ministers who are actually assembled in Italy. We do not know the reason of these sudden changes."

" Several remarkable arresis are reported to have taken place at Verona, Padua and Venice."

In addition to the above, it is stated in the Courier, that no intelligence of importance from Verona had transpired at Paris up to the evening of the 1st.

Advices from St. Petersburg to the 16th October, stared that the Emperor was expected to return to that city by the end of December or begining of January.

As regards the affairs of the Greeks and Turks, we are as usual in the dark. this subject the Courier of the 5th contains extracts from the Austrian Observer of the 23d of October, on which the editor observes, " the main fact of the retreat of the Turks upon Corinth is corroborated; but there appears to have been no ground for the vailnting accounts which have been circulated of the successes of the Greeks.

It is stated that Sir Henry Wellesley will succeed the Marquis of Londonderry as Ambas ador at the Court of Vienna."

The advices from Madrid are to the 25th of Ocuber, at which time that city was in a state of perfect tranquillity. The Ministry had determined to bring to immediate trial hose noblemen suspected of having favored an insurrection of the guards of the 7th of July. The Government had declared the sum to be raised by loans to amount to for:y millions reals de rente, equivalent at the ex isting price of Spanish security, to about P5.600,000.

The British stocks had not varied in price from the 25th Oct. to Nov. 5th. being each day 821 -- New Dollars 4s 91.
