PLYMOUTH, June 12: The Jupiter, 60, went out of Portsmouth harbour on Tuesday se'nnight, preparatory to sailing for Halifax.

The Nieman, 23, was paid off at Portsmouth on Thursday, and re-commissioned by Capt. Provo Wm. Parry Wallace, (who was Lieut. of the Shannon, at the capture of the Chesapeake) at Portsmouth.

The Vibilia, transport, Lieut. W. Parker, has sailed from Portsmouth for Liverpool, to receive the 96th regt. of foot, and thence she will proceed to Halifax and Barbadoes; and the Success, transport Lt. Pritchard, Agent for Cowes, where she embarks troops for the Mediterranean.

A bill has been brought into Parliament to enable the India Company to send ships direct from China, with tea and other Chinese productions to any of the British Colonies in America. The following has been politely handed us by Mr. Bonnett:

East India House June 4. 1824' The Court of Directors of the United Company of Merchants of England trading to the East Indies, do hereby give notice,

That a Special General Court of the said Company will be held in their house Leadinhall street, on Wednesday next, the 9th inst. at 11 o'clock, in the forenoon for the purpose of laying before the proprietors a Draft of a Bill now before Parliament to authorize the East India Company to trade direct from China to the British Colonies and Plantations in America.

LONDON, JUNE 10. NORTHERN EXPEDITION.

A correspondent has kindly favoured us with the following communication :---

Custom-House, Thurso, May 21, 1824. As the public are much interested in every thing which concerns the brave Capt. Parry and his dauntless followers, who have again renewed their perilous wanderings on the ocean, I take the libertty to acquaint you, for the information of your readers, that the Hecla and Fury passed through the Pentland Firth yesterday afternoon with their colours flying. They had a fine favourable breeze, and as it still continues, it is supposed that this evening these brave men will, for a time, bid farewell to the shores of their native

They were piloted though the frith by a fishing smack, the master of which reports, that the crew of both vessels were in great spirits, and most of them who could write, gladly embraced the opportunity of his returning, to forward a few farewell lines to their relations and friends.

An official despatch to the Admiralty, and a bag of letters from each ship, which were sent to this office, accompanied by a polite card from Capt. Parry, have, in terms of his request, been forwarded by the mail, agreeably to their several addresses.

The impression on the seals of many of the seamen's letters was " though lost to sight to memory dear;" a motto, no doubt reciprocal to the feelings of their friends at home, who from this time must feel a deep anxiety for the success and safety of those brave and intrepid adventurers-a feeling which their countrymen in general must also anticipate .-- Inverness Courier.

We are enabled to give the most unqualified contradiction to the story said to have been copied by the Jamaica papers from the Bogota Gazette, and which represents Col. Hamilton as having at a public audience, presented the Vice President Santander with a gold snuff box in the name of the king of England. At least, neither Col. Hamilton nor any other British Agent took out snuffboxes, or other presents, with the permission of the British Government, nor did their instructions authorize them to act in the manner that has been described.

Extract of a letter from the Agents to Lloyd's at Genoa, dated May 24 .-- "We

have now to acquaint you that Stephana Capola, master at N. S. del Carmine, under the Sardian flag, who arrived here lately from Gergenti, has reported to us, that on the 30th ult. from the heights of said place, was discovered a numerous convoy of vessels, and that on the 1st. inst. about five o'clock, A. M. the report of sundry guns was heard, which, at first was taken for a salute; but as the firing of connon became more frequent, and the report of several broad sides was distinctly heard, made them suppose it to be an action fought by some men of war, but could not discover of what nation, as they were too far distant; they could only see the smoke in a south direction; the wind was SSE: the report of cannon lasted four hours, but could not learn any result. The same master adds, that by the arrival of a Sperowra from Malta, they learnt that a convoy of seventy sail of vessels had sailed from that port to the westward under the escort of a brig of war, and that soon after two frigates had likewise made sail, which made them conjecture that the convoy had fallen in with some Algerine men of war."

The statements respecting the scarcity of rice at Madras, and the fears expressed of a famine, are, we are happy to find, greatly exaggerated.
