The affairs of the Greeks continue to prosper. Corinth had fallen, and the siege of Missolunghi had been raised.

The Count de Schonwaoff Adjutant-General of the Emperor of Russia, died suddenly on the 13th December at St. Petersburgh.

The Courier asserts, that indirect measures are taking to dethrone Bernadotte, King of Sweden.

By an enactment of the Legislature of the Island of Jamaica, all vessels arriving in the ports of the island, not directly consigned by a certified bill of lading and invoice to a resident merchant, are subject to a charge of 5 per cent. transient, and 21 per cent, parochial tax on the gross sales of the

This regulation is ordered to go into operation from the first day of Jan. 1824, and the consignee has to swear that the same is charged, and that the property was regularly consigned by bill of lading in the United States, duly certified to by the British Con-

An indorsation after the vessel arrives at a port of the Island, is not sufficient to evade the tax.

EXTRAORDINARY OPERATION. On Monday morning about ten o'clock, a young man about 24 years of age, named Henry Goodheart, in the imploy of Mr. Edwards, patent desk, manufacturer to his Majesty, at the corner of King street, Bloomsbury, went into the Hope Coffee-House, Theobald's road, to breakfast, after which he took a little child belonging to the proprietor of the house into his arms, and played with it some time, in the course of which, the child put a half-penny, one of the large old ones of

the date of 1779 into the young man's mouth, who in order to pacify the child rattled it about his mouth, making a noise against his reeth, when by the action of the muscles, it was propelled into the throat and in his efforts of get it back again went lower. From the size of the halfpenny he immediately felt a sense of suffocation, and laboured under the most acute agony; Mr. Stephen White, a surgeon, of No. 1 Lamb's Conduit-street, was without delay applied to, and on his attending the sufferer, he found him sitting in a chair by the fire, in a stooping position, and with his hand pressed hard against his stomach. Mr. White (from the sensation the young man described to him) conceived the halfpenny had reached his stomach, and accordingly proper medicines were administered for its removal which were continued for several hours; but afforded no relief although they operated powerfully. Fears were then entertained for his safety, and at 5 o'clock in the evening all medicines having proved abortive, Mr. White, as the last extremity, with the consent of the patient, introduced into the asaphagus an instrument called a probang, of very large size. During the operation the young man's head was held back as far as possible, and his arms were also secured. The instrument was then introduced into the stomach, and extraordinary to relate, by a sudden jirk of the probang upwards, the halfpenny was brought out of the asaphagus, and the young man was instantly relieved. He is now pursuing his avocations as if nothing had happened. The appearance of the poor fellow before the operation, contrasted with it after it had been performed, was most remarkable; before he seemed quite depressed, having an impression on his mind, death would ensue; and after the halfpenny had been brought forth he jumped from his seat with extacy, and appeared very grateful to every body around him, exclaiming, "Thank God, its out." We never recollect the performance of an operation of this description before with such success, with the probang.



LONDON, FEB. 7. IMPERIAL PARLIAMENT.

HOUSE OF LORDS, TUESDAY, FEB. 2.

Parliament was opened by Commission this day, the Commissioners being the Lord Chancellor, the Archbishop of Canterbury, the Earl Westmoreland, and the Earl Shaftesbury.

The Royal Speech was delivered by the Lord Chancellor as fellows :-

" MY LORDS AND GENTLEMEN, "We are commanded by His Majesty to express to you His Majesty's deep regret, that, in consequence of indisposition, he is prevented from meeting you in Parliament upon the present occasion.

"It would have been a peculiar satisfaction to His Majesty, to be enabled, in person, to congratulate you on the prosperous condition of the country.

"Trade and Commerce are extending themselves both at home and abroad.

" An increasing activity pervades almost every branch of manufacture.

"The growth of the Revenue is such as not only to sustain public credit, and to prove the unimpaired productiveness of our resources, but (what is yet more gratifying to His Majesty's feelings) to evince a diffusion of comfort among the great body of the pec-

" Agriculture is increasing from the depression under which it laboured, and by the steady operation of natural causes is gradually reassuming the station to which its importance entitles it, among the great interests of the nation.

"At no former period has there pervailed throughout all classes of the community in this Island, a more cheerful spirit of orders or a more just sense of the advantages which under the blessing of Providence, they en-

" In Ireland, which for some time past has been the object of His Majesty's particular solicitude, there are many indications of amendment, and His Majesty relies nuon your continued endeavours to secure the welfare and Lappiness of that part of the Kingdom.

" His Majesty commanded us further to inform you, that he has every reason to believe that the progress of our internal prosperity and improvement will not be disturbed by any interruption of tranquillity abroad.

" His Majesty continues to receive from the Powers, his Allies, and generally from all Princes and States, assurances of their earnest desire to maintain and cultivate the relations of friendship with His Majerit, and nothing is omitted, on His Majesty's part, as well to preserve general prace as to remove any causes of disagreement, and to draw closer the bonds of ami y between other Nations and Great-Britain.

"The Negociations which have been so long carried on the ugh his Majesty's Ambassador at Constantinople for the arrangement of differences between Russia and the Ottoman Porte, are, as His Mujesty flatters himself, drawing near to a favourable termination, its for the state of th

"A Convention has been concluded between His Majesty and the Emperor of Austria, for the settlement of the prountary claims of the country, upon the Court of Vienna.

His Majesty has directed that a Copy of this Convention shall be laid before you, and he relies on your assistance for the execution of some of its provisions.

"Anxiously as His Majesty deprerated the commencement of the war in Spain, he is every day more satisfied that in the strict neutrality which he determined to observe in that contest, (and which you so cordinity approved,) he consulted the true interests of his people.

"With respect to the Provinces of America, which have declared their separation from Spain, His Majesty's conduct has been open and consistent, and his epinions have been at all times fairly avowed to Spain and to other Powers.

. " His Majesty has appointed Consuls to reside at the principal ports & places to those Provinces, for the protection of the trade of his subjects.

"As-to any further measures, Alis Majesty has reserved to himself, an unferiend discretion to be exercised as the interests of his own People may appear to His Majesty to require.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

" His Majesty has directed us to inform you, that the Estimates for the year are prepared, and shall be forthwith laid tefore you.

The numerous points at which, under present circumstances, Elis Majesty's naval force is necessarily distributed, and the occasions which have arisen for screngthening his garrisons in the West Indies have rendered unavoidable some augmentation of his Establishments, by sea and land.

"His Masesty has, however, the gratification of believing that notwithstanding the increase of expence, incident to these augmentations, it will still be in your power, after providing for the services of the year, to make arrangements in some parts of our system of taxation, which may afford relief to certain important branches of the national in-

My Lords and Gentlemen, " His Majesty has commanded us to acquaint you, that he has not been inattentive to the desire expressed by the House of Commons in the last Session of Parliament, that means should be devised for meliorating the condition of the Negro Slaves in the West Indies.

" His Majesty has directed the necessary information relative to this subject, to be laid before you. " His Majesty is confident, that you will afford your best attention and assistance to any proposition which may be submitted to you, for promoting the moral improvement of the Negroes, by an

extended plan of religious instruction, and by such other measures as may gradually conduce to the " But His Majesty earnestly recommends to you,

to treat the whole subject with the calmness and discretion which it demands "To excite exaggerated expectations in those

who are the objects of your benevolence, would be as fatal to their welfare, as to that of their employers, . " And His Majesty assures himself you will bear in mind, that where the correction of a long standing and complicated system, and the safety of large classes of His Majesty's Subjects are involved, that course of proceeding is alone likely to attain practical good, and to avoid the aggravation of evil, in which regard should be paid to considerations of justice, and in which caution shall temper zeal "

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
