WHEREAS the General Assembly of this Province, stands prorogued to Wednesday the first day of December next, I have thought fit further to prorogue the said General Assembly, and the same is hereby prorogued to Tuesday the first day of February next ensuing—*then to meet at Fredericton, for the dispatch of business.*

NOTICE.

For the Information of those who may have Business to transact with the Lieutenant-Governor; His Excellency has appointed Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday, in each week, as the days on which, from ten to one o'clock, he will be prepared to attend to the common routine of Business.

Though the Lieutenant-Governor wishes the routine business of the Province to be confined to the abovementioned Days and Hours, yet His Excellency is accessible at all times to persons on urgent and unforeseen Business, and coming from a distant part of the Province.

Return to express in separate columns the following particulars.

- Name, and designation of Office.
- Office.
- Date of appointment.
- By whom appointed and under what Instrument.
- Whether Office executed by Principal or by Deputy; if by Deputy his name.
- Annual salary in sterling and Currency, with rate of Exchange.
- Fees during the year which has expired, in currency and sterling value.
- Nett amount received by Principal, and by Deputy, in currency and sterling.
- Whether Principal or Deputy be allowed a House for personal residence, or what allowance, if any, for House rent or Quarters.
- Whether Office be held by Principal in conjunction with any and what other Civil, Military or Naval office or appointment or place of Profit, in any Colony or on the establishment of the United Kingdom. If the office be held by a Military or Naval Officer, whether upon full or half Military or Naval pay, the total amount of pay and allowances of every kind actually received by him in addition to the Profits of his Office.
- Periods during which the officer has been absent on leave from the Colony.

Whether the Principal or his Deputy enjoy any and what other advantage or profit, not required to be stated in the preceding column.

Remarks in explanation of the duties of the office and of such subjects as require elucidation.

AN AWFUL MOMENT.

We never recollect perusing any descriptive sketch more awfully impressive, or more unflatteringly related, than the following:

From the Cincinnati Literary Gazette of January 24.

The note, in which the following was enclosed, mentions it is the account of an event which really occurred to the writer as related.

I sailed from New Orleans in the beginning of February 1822, in a small schooner, bound for New York. We descended the river without any accident, and went to sea with a fine breeze; we had favourable winds and good weather for the first five days. On the morning of the sixth, it began to cloud up, as the day wore away the gloom increased, and when the night set in, it was as intensely dark, as ever I remember to have seen it.—The novelty and interest of my situation prevented me from turning in; the sea was awfully grand—the rolling of the thunder could just be distinguished above the roaring of the waves and the vivid flashes of lightning dispersed for a moment the gloom, and showed the raging waters round us. I continued walking the deck with the Captain, who was relating to me some of the many dangers and difficulties that a life of thirty years on the ocean had subjected him to. He had been thrice shipwrecked, and twice captured by the enemy in the war with England. He was a good seaman, and had all the virtues and vices of a sailor. We continued on deck some time; the wind had now increased to a gale. The waves ran mountain high, and our little vessel danced over in fine style, when, accidentally casting my eye over her side, I thought I perceived something dark moving in the water; I pointed it out to the Captain, who no sooner saw it, then with an exclamation of terror and despair he cried 'we are all lost,' and sprang to the binnacle for his trumpet. I saw in an instant our danger; it was a large ship with all her sails set bearing full upon us. It knew if she struck us our destruction was inevitable; the people on her deck would be scarce sensible of the event, and we should be buried in the ocean without the least possibility of relief. The Captain twice raised his trumpet to hail her, but fright and despair made him mute; I snatched it from him, and in a voice rendered supernaturally loud by the danger of my situation, and which was heard, even above the roaring of the waves, I hailed her with 'starboard your helm.' In an instant after I heard the offi-

cer on her deck, in a voice less loud than mine, pass the word of 'hard a starboard.' In another moment she past us with the velocity of lightning, her huge hull and lofty sails casting a soill deeper gloom over the deck of our little vessel. She rolled in the chasm occasioned by the passing of the vast body so nigh her, and nearly upset. I sank on deck, overcome by the intensity of my feelings, and deprived as it were of the power of motion I recovered myself and approached our Capt.; he was standing in the same position as before the vessel had passed us, and he appeared to be insensible to the objects around him. I spoke to him, but he answered me not; I shook him, and he roused as from a stupor or reverie. It was some time before his mind resumed her empire, and he afterwards told me, that in all his dangers and perils, and when death stared him in the face, and deliverance seemed impossible he was never so impressed with the certainty of his destruction as at that moment. As for me, I shall never forget my feelings on that eventful night, and can not even now look back without horror on the danger of my situation.

The Cuba Pirates.

Aaron Smith, who, our readers may recollect was tried at an Admiralty Sessions at the Old Bailey, in Dec. last charged with committing acts of piracy on board the British brig Victoria, Capt. Hearne, on her passage from Black River to London, and acquitted, on the ground of his having perpetrated those acts from compulsion, has lately published a book, in which is contained the following account of the Cuba pirates.

A quarrel took place between two of the crew, and a desperate fight with knives ensued of which the rest were cool spectators. The battle was for a long time doubtful, as both fought with equal skill and equal degree of caution, notwithstanding they were intoxicated until one fell with a severe stab in the left breast, bleeding profusely. A was instantly called to administer to the wounded man; and it was in vain for me to declare that I knew nothing of the healing art. The Captain swore at me, and said he knew to the contrary; for the master of the Zephyr had informed him that I had cured and saved the life of his sail maker, who had fallen down the hold; and therefore, if I did not cure him, he would serve me in the same manner. I saw it would be useless to make any reply; and therefore, having procured bandages, I stanch'd the blood and dressed his wounds in the best manner I was able. Having attended to one patient, I was then oblig'd to turn my attention to his antagonist, who has not escaped unhurt. When I had completed my task, I was carelessly complimented on my skill, and asked if the wound was mortal, which question I evaded, by saying I hoped not.

The guests were scarcely gone when the captain went below, and enquired of the least injured of the wounded men, the cause of their quarrel. He hesitated at first to tell, and supplicated that he might be forgiven for his neglect in not having furnished him with the important intelligence before. This being granted, he told the pirate, that his antagonist was one of the party formed by the chief mate to assassinate him and the whole crew, and take possession of the ship and plunder. That officer, he informed him, had gone to the Havana, for the express purpose of bringing some more men, and that they were to put the plan into effect when himself and the crew were either asleep or inebriated. I saw that his brutal temper was excited by this information; his eyes flashed fire, and his whole countenance was distorted. He vowed destruction against the whole party, and rushing upon deck, assen-
