

The requisite vouchers are produced, and an affidavit is made to the account. No charge is made for his time and trouble. The whole is satisfactory.

4. Is W. H. Mowat's account, for the sum of £26, expended on the road leading from St. Andrews to Chameook, with a receipt from the Contractor for that sum. He charges 20s. paid for measuring and viewing the Road, and 60s. for his own expenses, making altogether the sum of £30, which sum he has received from the Deputy Treasurer at St. Andrews. There is no affidavit to this account.

5. Is a letter and receipt from Mr. George Harding, by which it appears that he has paid the sum of £39 3 2½ remaining in his hands, belonging to the Province, to Edward N. Scovil.

6. Is Jacob Young's account for £30 expended by him on the Road from Quintin's to Pagan's Mill-Stream, and in repairing a Bridge.

An affidavit accompanies this account. The appropriation for this Road was made in 1820.

7. Is William John Layton's account against Jacob Kollock, Esq. for exploring the proper direction of a Road to be laid out between the Konchiak and Richibucto, and between Miramichi and Buctouche, and for making plans, writing contracts, and making a report. This account amounts to £87 10 8. Jacob Kollock, the Supervisor, certifies that the account is according to agreement with him, and correct. The Committee beg leave to call the attention of the House to this account, the report of the Surveyor, and the report of the Supervisor.

8. Is an account of William B. Cripps, for the sum of £25 expended by him on the Road from Hands' Farm to the Great Road leading from St. Andrews to St. John. An affidavit and voucher accompany the account, and the whole are satisfactory.

9. This is an account of Bijah Ingraham, for work done at the Meductic Falls, in the year 1816, under the inspection of Major M. Kay and Major Ketchum, amounting to £146 13 3.

10. Is another account from the same person, for work done at the same place in 1817, amounting to £4 13 9.

11. An account from the same person, for work done at the same place in 1819 and 1820, amounting to £7 10 9.

12. This is James Taylor's account for money paid Bijah Ingraham, amount £150—for which sum he credits a warrant on the Treasury.

13. Is John M. Kay's report of the expenditure of £150, granted by the Legislature for the improvement of the Navigation of the River St. John, at Meductic Falls, under the direction of Major M. Kay and Ketchum, shewing a balance due to B. Ingraham, of £1 17 9.

Affidavits accompany the accounts: No. 9, 10, and 11.

14. A report from Richard Ketchum, Esquire, Commissioner for laying out £150 at Meductic Falls, and £25 at Feroes Rocks, by which it appears that he has received the above sums from the Treasury, and has paid £96 16. The balance is to be paid when the Contracts made by him are completed.

An affidavit is made to the report, and vouchers for £88.

15. This is an account current of Edward N. Scovil, with the Province, by which it appears that he has received from the Treasury, £750, and from George Harding, £39 3 2½—making £789 3 2½.

Mr. Scovil has expended £674 on the Road from St. John to the Province Line, and from Dorchester to Chediak, and thence to the Peticoctiac. He charges 10 per cent. on the money expended, which amounts to £67 8 0. And £10 for inspecting the Roads and making a report in 1822, by order of the Lieutenant-Governor, 10 0 0. Money expended, 674 0 0.

An affidavit and vouchers accompany the account, and the whole are satisfactory.

16. Is Thomas Wier's account current with the Province, for money expended on the Road from St. John to St. Andrews, amount £356 6 8. He credits £355 received from the Treasury, leaving a balance due to Thomas Wier, Esquire, of £1 6 8.

An affidavit accompanies the account, which is satisfactory.

A report is also made by the Supervisor, to which the Committee beg leave to call the attention of the House.

17. Is the account current of Colin Campbell, Esq. Supervisor of the Great Road from Fredericton to St. Andrews, with the Province.

By this account it appears that the Supervisor has expended on the said Road, £410 6 11. His allowance at 10 per cent., 40 7 5.

An affidavit accompanies the account, and vouchers are produced for the whole, except a few small charges of small consequence. The Supervisor has also furnished vouchers for £187 10, which was required the last Session.

A report and plan accompanies the Supervisor's account, containing much information, which report the Committee recommend to the attention of the House. The whole is satisfactorily stated.

18. This is an affidavit from Jacob Allen, to the account which he furnished at the last Session of the General Assembly, for the expenditure of £25 on the Road from Poquiac Bridge towards Ingraham's Mills. Jacob Allen's accounts for the said expenditure, are now satisfactory.

19. This is an account from Thomas Jones, for money expended on the Road between George Jones' and Jacob Ellegood's, in the Parish of Prince William. The proper vouchers and affidavit are also produced.

The Commissioner has expended, £49 18 0. And he charges 5 per cent. commission, 2 10 0.

He credits a warrant on the Treasury, for 50 0 0

Leaving a balance due to him, £2 8 0

20. This is an application from Thomas C. Lee, Esquire, late a Supervisor of Great Roads, by which it appears that the sum of £18 7 6, which he was required to account for in 1822, should have been £17 11 1½—since which he expended £20 for cutting wind falls, which was allowed to him last year. The balance due to him would therefore be £2 8 0½.

Mr. Lee prays, that the House will reconsider the charge of £6 which was not allowed to him at the last Session, and that they will now direct that he may receive that sum. If the House allow this sum, the balance due to Thos. C. Lee, Esq. will be £8 0½.

21. Is John M'Allister's and James Buchanan's account, with affidavit and vouchers, for £192 10 3, expended by them as Commissioners for improving the Navigation of the River Saint Croix. They credit £200 received from the Province Treasury, which leaves a balance in their hands of £7 9 9.

22. Is Joseph N. Clark, Esquire, and Timothy Crocker's account, as Commissioners for the expenditure of £76 15 10, for improving the Road between Porter's in St. Stephen, and M'Allister's at Oak Bay. They charge £3 16 9 for commissions—the whole amounting to £80 12 9.

An affidavit accompanies the account, and vouchers for £57 18 1. They give no credit for any money received from the Province Treasury.

23. Is James Gilmour and William Abrams' account, with affidavit and vouchers for £203 14, expended by them as Commissioners for building a Bridge across Fort Cove, 210 feet long and 21 feet high. They credit £200 received from the Province Treasury, and £3 14 from the Commissioners of Highways of New-Castle.

24. Is John Hazen, junior's account, as Commissioner on the Nerepis Road, with affidavit and vouchers for the expenditure of £443. He charges for commissions at 10 per cent. £50. He credits £440 19 10, and also £50 9 2, received from the Province Treasury, which leaves a balance in his hands of £7.

25. Is the account of the Commissioners of the Revenue Cutter, to amount of £2438 6 5½. They credit £299 11 9, received from the Province Treasury—which leaves a balance due them of £1508 14 8½.

#### The Funeral of the late Honorable WARD CHIPMAN, President and Commander in-Chief of this Province.

The Remains of our late much lamented and highly esteemed PRESIDENT, were yesterday interred. They were attended by a large assemblage of the Inhabitants of the Town, and other parts of the Province, who appeared actuated by a general feeling of regret for the loss which the Public had sustained.

The Corpse was taken from His Honor's late residence, to the Church, and from thence to the Public Cemetery, where it was deposited with Military Honors.

The Funeral Procession was arranged by His Majesty's Council, and was in the following order:—

His HONOR the late PRESIDENT, was bred to the Law; and he had scarcely commenced his professional career, when those differences took place which led to the In-

dependence of the United States. Attached to his KING, he took a decided part in favor of the Royal cause, and, on the evacuation of Boston by the King's Forces, was obliged to leave his native land, and went to England, where he obtained a Pension, and might have quietly awaited the issue of the then eventful contest; but his intelligent and vigorous mind, was better suited to more active scenes. Soon after we had taken possession of New-York, he resigned his Pension, and embarked for that place, where, in addition to an employment in the office of Muster-Master-General of the King's American Forces, he pursued his profession, with great credit and emolument. After the signing the preliminaries of peace, he returned to England. On the erection of this Province, he was appointed Solicitor General. Immediately on his appointment, he came out to this Country, where he was soon after appointed Advocate General in the Admiralty; and the assistance he rendered in the first formation of our Institutions, greatly contributed to their efficacy and excellency. He represented the City and County of Saint John, in the first House of Assembly, and continued a Member of that Branch of the Legislature, until 1796. In the year 1806, he became a Member of His Majesty's Council, and in 1808, was appointed to a Seat upon the Bench of the Supreme Court. In the year 1796, he was appointed His Majesty's Agent before the Commissioners under the 5th Article of the Treaty of 1794, between His Majesty and the United States, to determine which was the River truly intended by the name of the River St. Croix, in the Treaty of 1783; and it was mainly owing to his indefatigable research and able exertions, that His Majesty's claim to the River Scudiac, as the River truly intended in that Treaty, was established by the Commissioners—the American Government having claimed the River Magagaudavic, as the River in question. In the year 1815, he was again selected by His Majesty's Government, as the Agent to manage the business on the part of His Majesty, before the Commissioners under the 4th and 5th Articles of the Treaty of Ghent; the former relating to the Islands in Passamaquoddy Bay, and the Island of Grand Manan in the Bay of Fundy, and the latter to the interior boundary described in the Treaty of 1783, from the source of the St. Croix to the St. Lawrence. His exertions under those Commissions, were equally able and laborious. The question under the 4th Article, relating to the Islands, was brought to a satisfactory termination—those which arose under the 5th Article, respecting the interior Boundary, still remain unsettled, the Commissioners having differed in opinion, and made separate reports to their respective Governments, under the provisions of the Treaty. On the death of the late Lieutenant-Governor, the administration of the government of this Province, devolved upon his HONOR. In the execution of its important duties, he had the confidence of His Majesty's Ministers, and the esteem and good wishes of the Inhabitants of this Colony. Thus has terminated a long and useful life, clothed with the highest honors, in a Province where he had passed nearly 40 years of his life, and for the prosperity of which he was ever most anxious. In the performance of the duties of the many and important offices which he had filled, His HONOR uniformly displayed superior talents, great energy of character, and the most unblemished integrity—while in private life he was endeared to all who knew him, by the warmth of his affections and the most active benevolence of disposition.
