HOWARD DOUGLAS. A Proclamation.

WHEREAS the General Assembly of this Province, stands prorogued to Wednesday the first day of December next, I have thought fit further to prorogue the said General Assembly, and the same is hereby prorogued to Tuesday the first day of February next ensuing—*then to meet at Fredericton, for the dispatch of business.*

Given under my Hand and Seal, at Fredericton, the twelfth day of November, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and twenty-four, and in the fifth year of His Majesty's Reign.

For the Information of those who may have Business to transact with The LIEUTENANT-GOVERNOR; His Excellency has appointed Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday, in each week, as the days on which, from ten to one o'clock, he will be prepared to attend to the common routine of Business.

Though the LIEUTENANT-GOVERNOR wishes the routine business of the Province to be confined to the abovementioned Days and Hours, yet His Excellency is accessible at all times to persons on Urgent and unforeseen Business, and coming from a distant part of the Province.

Terrible Catastrophe. On the 18th of September, about the middle of the day, there was a tremendous explosion at the powder factory of Messrs. Laffin and Looms, in Lee. In some inconceivable manner, a spark of fire was produced in the glazing house, which instantly exploded; and in about half a minute there was an explosion of the hot house which was situated some rods from the other. In the glazing house there was about 2500 lb. of powder, and in the hot house about 5000 lb. The effects of the explosion would have been still more dreadful, had it not been for the removal of five tons of powder from the hot house a few days since. Both buildings were blown to atoms and the fragments fell in all directions, some being carried to the distance of from a quarter of a mile. Most of the timbers were shattered to pieces but one stick of the weight of three or four hundred, was carried nearly fifty rods. About thirty buildings in the vicinity were more or less injured; a great portion of the windows broken, boards torn off and in some instances the roofs raised. It is a curious fact that in some cases, windows and boards were broken in by the pressure from the outside; and in other cases they were broken out by the superior pressure of the air on the inside, after the force on the outside was exhausted.

But the fragments scattered over this scene of desolation, might be viewed with comparative insensibility, were they not mingled with the blood and broken bodies of our fellow creatures. Four men, Tarsce, Sparks, Beach, and Hinckley, were in or near the glazing house at the time of the explosion. Tarsce was found dead on the margin of the river, his body much bruised and burnt, and partially covered with the fragments of the buildings. Sparks was blown some distance up the hill, his body dreadfully mangled and his bowels torn out. Beach was thrown about forty rods into the mill pond, and was not found for some hours after the catastrophe. Hinckley was blown some distance into the river, and is since dead.
