BOSTON, DEC. 23.

A schooner of about 170 tons, with Dutch colors, armed with 9 pounders, and having on board 237 slaves, was captured Nov. 2d, by the British government sch'r *Union*, after a running fight of three hours, and carried into *Port Royal*, Jam.
A letter from *St. Jago*, *Cuba*, Oct. 25th, mentions the arrival of 2 vessels from *Hava-*

na, with 47,000 dls. for Gen. *Morales*—that an expedition was fitting out, destination not known—and that 4000 troops had arrived at *Principe* on their way to *St. Jago*, to join it.

Baltimore, Dec. 17.—The fast sailing sch'r *Blucher*, arrived here yesterday in 33 days from *Cadiz*.—There were in the port of *Cadiz* two French ships of the line and four frigates, with several smaller vessels.—The French were putting naval stores for three years in the city of *Cadiz*. There were about 3000 men there. The Spanish men of war, as they arrived from sea, were sent to the navy yard, stripped and laid up. The Spanish troops were not permitted to be under arms in the city. The French frigate *Le Tonante* sailed from *Cadiz* on the 5th Nov, with a Spanish Governor for *Havana*, and to bring home the present one. It is possible this measure may produce some agitation in *Cuba*.

A little disagreement has again arisen between the Gov. of *Canada* and the Legislature on the appointment of Sheriff *Sewell*.—The Legislature has before it a Bill respecting the importation of Tea.

IMPORTANT—At *Washington*, on the 15th inst. the Committee of Foreign Relations, was summoned to meet at an early hour—and there are rumours that the subject for consideration was a proposition from *England* for a union in favour of the independence of *South America*.

We were informed yesterday, by good authority, that *Spain* has actually ceded *Cuba* to *France*.—*N. Y. Gaz.*

It was reported at *New-York* on Thursday last, that the public would find the rumour of the cession of *Cuba* to *France* correct—and that the President was undoubtedly apprised of the fact before he delivered his late Message.

The President's Message has been translated into Spanish, by a South American Patriot at *Baltimore*, printed as a pamphlet, with a preface, and is to be sent to *Mexico*, *Colombia*, &c.

A London paper states, that nearly thirty sail of vessels had been driven on shore on the French coast, near *Havre*, on the 1st. Nov.

It was reported at *Havana*, on the 3d inst. that the Castle of *St. Juan de Ulloa* had surrendered to the *Mexicans*.

From *Lisbon*, Nov. 13.—Capt. Lane heard reports that an expedition was to be sent to *Brazil*, but saw no preparations for it. There were 10 vessels of war in port.

LATEST FROM ENGLAND.

London Papers to the 10th ult. have been received by an arrival at *New-York*.

All the cities of *Spain* appear to have submitted to the French, except *Carthage*.

We have the *British Traveller* and *Courier* of the 10th, both of which incline to be of opinion that the government will make a decided stand against any measures which the Holy Alliance may adopt to replace the *South American* Provinces under the control of *Spain*. A number of vessels of war were fitting out in *England*, for foreign service.

It was reported that the King of *France* was seriously indisposed.

The French are to have important commercial privileges in the *Spanish Colonies*—but they must have peace to enjoy them.

France has garrisoned *Alegziras*, near *Gibraltar*, and sent a force to *Ceuta*.

The King of *Spain*, has ordered his confessor and Prime Minister, *Saez*, to prepare a project respecting the revolted Colonies.

The Spanish King is said to be very flipant in his orders for sending ships of war to *America*—but none can move unless money can be found for their equipment.

Information from *Constantinople* is to Oct. 10. The *Janissaries* appear to have again become mutinous.

English Funds at *London*, **November**, 10 Consols for Acct. opened at 83 and rose to 83 1/2.

NEW-YORK, Dec. 19.—The advices from *Madrid*, are to the 3d of **Nov.** and those from *Cadiz* not so late as have been received here direct.

Lerida was occupied by the French on the 31st of **Oct.** and the troops of the garrison, to the number of 5000, surrendered prisoners of war.

The Duke d'Angouleme arrived at *Madrid* on the 1st of **Nov.** attended by an escort of only 30 dragoons, and 30 gendarmes. He was accompanied by the Prince of *Carignan*.

There seems to have been some commotion in *Barcelona*, but by the latest date from *Mataro*, (Nov. 1) it would seem that the troubles had been appeased, and it was supposed the French would enter the city immediately. During the troubles, *Mina* it is said, found rebels among his old accomplices, and was obliged, himself, to take refuge in the midst of his troops, to save himself from the militiamen. He had arrested the famous *Costa*, a chief of that band. Marshal *Moncey* has sent to *Paris* the conditions of the capitulation, which are approved and signed by the Commissioners and Generals in Chief of both armies. All the Constitutional Chiefs in *Estremadura* have made their submission, with the exception of the *Empecinado* who has not yet sent in his. The Brigadier *Laguna* took possession of the fortress of *Badajoz* on the 29th of **Oct.**

The accounts from *Constantinople* are to the 19th of **Oct.** The pacific disposition of the *Ottoman Porte* has caused in that city a remarkable activity. Liberty of Commerce, and privileges to the Europeans have again been granted.

The interview of the two Emperors (of *Austria* and *Russia*), at *Czernowitz*, has made a great impression on the *Divan*.

The last letters from *Greece* state, that the fleet of the *Capit. Pacha* has arrived in the *Dardanelles*, and gone into the port of *Constantinople*. The above letters also stated, that the movements of the *Janissaries* cause great alarm to the Government.

MADRID, Oct. 25.—*Ferdinand* still so far depends on his resources, that he has already given orders to send to the *Havana*, and then to *Lima*, the poor remains of the *Spanish Navy*, consisting of the *Asia* ship of the line, two frigates, a corvette and two brigs. This expedition will be seconded by some French vessels, which will join it in *America*. It is also affirmed that the French commerce, will enjoy henceforth, at the *Havana* and in the colonies which are not yet independent, several important privileges. The journey of his Royal Highness to *Madrid*, preceded by his head quarters, is an indication of the return of part of the army to *France*, which at the same time, will scour the provinces of *Alicant*, *Carthage*, *Valencia* and *Arragon* on the one side, and *Andalusia*, *La Mancha* and *Castille*, on the other.

CORDOVA, Oct. 23.—*Don Victor Saez*, is occupied by order of the King with the grand affairs of the colonies; these fine and rich possessions, will soon, we do not doubt be again in possession of the King.

PORTSMOUTH, Nov. 8.—The *Cambridge*, of 80 guns, is ordered for active service, with a crew of 700 men. It is conjectured she is intended for the *South American* station.

The *Windsor Castle*, of 80 guns, is also ordered on the war establishment, instead of the *Genoa*, whose crew has been turned over to the former vessel.

The 12th regiment has just embarked on board the *Ganges*, 80, and the *Superb* 74.
